SEVENTEENTH CENTURY HEARTH MONEY ROLLS WITH
FULL TRANSCRIPT RELATING TO COUNTY SLIGO

INTRODUCTION

The Hearth Money Act of 1662 was one of those passed by the Irish Parliament soon after it had been reconstituted following the Restoration. The text of the act is printed in full in pages 5 to 12 *infra*, together with the official summary of the amending act of 1665. As a method of taxation it remained in force in Ireland, at least in a modified form, till the Union, though the unpopularity of a similar act in England resulted in its repeal in that country in 1689. An excellent summary by Charles McNeill of the Hearth Money Acts and their application to this country will be found in the *Journal of the County Louth Archaeological Society*, Vol. VI, p. 79 *seq.*

None of the original rolls has been preserved, but copies exist in a more or less complete form for a number of counties, particulars of which are given below (see pp. 3 and 4). These copies differ in value: some, notably that for Co. Tipperary—the only one from Munster which survives—were obviously carelessly transcribed.¹ This criticism is to some extent applicable to the Co. Sligo hearth money roll.

It is indeed fortunate that the Cooper family of Markree, Co. Sligo, preserved a copy of the roll for that county, for there is no other extant for Connacht (since the disastrous destruction of the Four Courts in 1922) except a few extracts relating to the family of Ganly, now in the Public Record Office. The Cooper manuscript collection was acquired by the National Library in 1948; the manuscript now under consideration is NL. MS. 2165.

The transcriber has made many obvious errors in transcribing place-names; and his—or from the handwriting I surmise that I should say her—apparent lack of local knowledge leads, for example, to the passing over the name of a parish as “illegible”, though the accompanying list of townlands comprised in it should have made its identification simple. Such obvious defects have now been rectified. Nothing, however, could be done to supply complete omissions of names which occur in a few places and are indicated by the transcriber as due to the original being there illegible or defaced.

Some of my identifications, though probable, are not certain: I have placed a question mark after these. Most of the doubtful cases are dealt with in footnotes. Apart from those so indicated, of the 433 denominations referred to below there are 23 which I am unable to identify.

The original is arranged under parishes, sub-divided into townlands or other sub-denominations, each of the latter being followed by the names of the residents therein. Very few householders were assessed with more than one hearth. Where two or more are recorded this fact is indicated in the text now presented. As will be seen from the wording of the act some of the poorer people were exempted from the first, though it is clear that these acts gave rise to abuses, particularly during the period that the collection of the tax was farmed out. In this connexion I should draw attention to the list of relevant proclamations which was compiled, and kindly given to me, by Dr. R. C. Simington, see p. 15 *seq.*

All the 39 parishes of Co. Sligo, including the three which lie partly in adjacent counties, appear in the roll (Killadoon being treated as part of Shancough). 433 townland or similar denominations are listed, compared with 859 in the Book of Survey and Distribution and approximately 1250 present day townlands.¹ Many of the latter, of course, were formed since the seventeenth century, particularly at the time of Griffith's Valuation in the 1850's, when minor denominations were often officially classed as townlands. Nevertheless the discrepancy is surprising, even allowing for the fact that no doubt so soon after the Cromwellian upheaval many areas contained no habitation liable to the tax.

A comparison of this roll with other contemporary sources reveals several interesting facts. I take two typical parishes: in Drumcliff (which now contains 60 townlands) 28 appear in the roll—25 so far identified and 3 not, though most of these latter occur also in the 1659 "census"; in Kilmongan the comparable figures are 22 modern, 11 in roll, 10 identified, 1 doubtful (this also occurs in the 1659 "census"). Turning now to personal names, all the six titulados listed in the "census" as resident in Kilmongan also appear in the hearth money roll for that parish, though in some cases with strange variations of spelling, e.g. Bierast for Bycroft.²

These are English names, but the contents of the roll clearly show the overwhelming preponderance of Irish names except in a few centres such as Sligo town.

The variant spellings of place-names will be apparent from a glance at the last two columns of the text; some of the strangest of these, however, e.g. rocll for rodd, are probably due to the Markree transcriber's unfamiliarity with seventeenth century handwriting.

Though not actually relevant to the hearth money rolls, it is perhaps worth mentioning here that the "census" of 1659 is incomplete for Co. Sligo: one fifth of the county, eight whole parishes—Ballynahkill, Calry, Kilcolman, Killaspughrone, Killerry, Kilmacowen, Killoran and Tawnagh—do not appear in it at all. Commentators on the "census", when drawing attention to other lacunae, do not appear to have made even the briefest reference to the omissions in Co. Sligo.

Copies of hearth Money Rolls of the 1660's are extant for the following counties:

Very few of these are complete copies of the original rolls, though in most cases the omissions are not extensive.

There are also in the Public Record Office, Dublin, the National Library, the Genealogical Office, Dublin, and in the Public Record Office, Belfast, some extracts from hearth money rolls relating to small areas or to individual surnames made from time to time in the course of genealogical searches. Some parish histories e.g. *Enniskillen Parish and Town* by W. H. Dundas, give details of the roll for the particular limited area under consideration, but in any of those I have seen the information thus presented is contained in one of the returns listed above. A few contemporary subsidy rolls and poll tax lists are preserved in one or more of those repositories. There are very few full copies of hearth money rolls for the eighteenth century extant. Some particulars of all the foregoing will be found in R. J. Hayes: *Manuscript sources for the history of Irish civilization*.

THE HEARTH MONEY ACTS

The Act of 1662, 14 & 15 Charles II, Chap. xvii

An Act of establishing an additional revenue upon his Majesty, his heirs and successors, for the better support of his and their crown and dignity.

FORASMUCH as nothing conduceth more to the peace and proþerty of a kingdom, and the protection of every fingle perfon therein, than that the publick revenue thereof may be in fome meafure proportioned to the publick charges and expences; in confideration thereof, and to the intent and purpoſe that his Maþefty, his heirs and fucceffors may receive a full and ample recompence and fatisfaction for the profits of the court of wards in this kingdom, and the tenures, wardships, liberties, *primer feizins, ouster lemans,* values and forfeitures of marriage, by reaþon of any tenure of the Kings Maþefty, or of any other by knights fervice, and all mean rates, and all other gifts, grants, charges incident or arifing for or by reaþon of the fame and other perquisits incident thereunto, and for all arrears, accompts and demands any way due, or payable for or by reaþon of the fame from any of his Maþefties ſubjects of this his kingdom of Ireland, ſince the three and twentieth of October, one thoufand fix hundred forty and one, or that may grow due hereafter; be it enacted and it is enacted by the Kings moft excellent Maþefty, by and with the advice and confeſt of the lords ſpiritual and temporal and commons in this preſent Parliament afſembled, and by the authority of the fame, That for the conſiderations aforefaid from and after the twenty ninth day of September, in the year of our Lord God one thoufand fix hundred fixty two, every dwelling and other houfe and edifice that are or hereafter shall be erected within this kingdom of Ireland, other than fuch as in this act are hereinafter excepted, shall be chargeable, and by this preſent act be and are charged with the annual paþment to the Kings Maþefty, his heirs and fucceffors for every fire hearth, and other place uſed for firing and ſtoves within every ſuch houfe and edifice as aforefaid, the fum of two fhillings, *fterl.* by the year, to be paid yearly and every year at the feaþt of the annuntiation of the Bleffed Virgin St. MARY, and the feaþt of St. MICHAEL the arch-angel, by even and equal portions; the firſt payment thereof to be paid upon the feaþt day of the annunciation of the Bleffed Virgin St. MARY, which ſhall be in the year of our Lord one thoufand fix hundred fixty three.

FOOTNOTE.

The text of this Act is taken from *Irish Statutes* officially published in 1765. In passing it to the printer I overlooked the fact that the eighteenth century fount used the old f for s. It seems unnecessary to have the whole seven pages re-set in order to correct this.

II. And to the intent that a just accompt may be had and taken of all the faid hearths, firing places and stoves by this act intended to be charged, be it enacted, and it is enacted by the authority aforesaid, that every owner or occupier of every such houfe and edifice shall respectively within fix days after notice given unto him or them by the respective constables of every parish, or by such other persons as are hereafter by this act appointed to be affifting to the faid constables in the execution of this act, deliver unto the faid constables, or such other persons as aforesaid respectively, a true and juft accompt in writing under the hands of such owners or occupiers as aforesaid of all the faid hearths, firing places and stoves, which are within their feveral and respective houfes and edifices aforesaid.

III. And be it enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the reſpective constables and ſuch other persons as are to be affiſting to them in ſuch manner as is hereafter exprefſed, within whose limits any ſuſh houfe or edifice charged by this act as aforesaid are, ſhall by the twentytith day of December yearly require the feveral occupiers of every ſuſh houfe and edifice aforesaid, to deliver unto them reſpectively accompts in writing as aforesaid under their feveral and reſpective hands of all ſuſh hearths, firing places and stoves as aforesaid, as ſhall be within their reſpective houfes and edifices, and upon receipt of the ſame, or upon default of ſuſh accompt in writing, or in caſe there be no occupiers, then within fix days after notice in writing fixed to the doore, requiring ſuſh accompt to be made, the faid constables, and ſuſh other persons as are to be affiſting to them reſpectively as aforesaid, ſhall enter into the ſaid reſpective houfes and edifices in the day time, and compare ſuſh accompts, and fee whether the ſame be truely made or not; and if no ſuſh accompt be delivered, then ſhall take information by their own view of the number of ſuſh hearths, firing places and stoves; upon pain that every constable and all and every ſuſh other perfon and perſons that are to be affiſting to constables in manner as is hereafter exprefſed, who ſhall neglect to do the ſame, ſhall forfeit for every week he or they ſhall fo neglect the ſum of forty ſhillings, and for every falſe return willfully made contrary to this act, he or they ſhall forfeit and loſe for every hearth, firing place or stove fo falſly returned or omitted, the ſum of forty ſhillings; and to the intent the faid return may be faithfully made, and his Majefties revenue not impaired by falſe or ſhort returns, the juſtices of the peace in the feveral counties, cities and towns of Ireland, being counties of themſelves, ſhall and may at any publick quarter-feeſions, or other feeſions of the peace after the nine and twentytith day of September in each year, nominate and appoint two perſons of good repute in each parish to joyn with and affiſt the constables in taking an accompt of the feveral hearths, firing places and stoves

in each parish, and making up the aforefaid returns, who together with the faid constables are to sign and make the faid returns.

IV. And in case any of the persons, who are so to affist in making the faid returns, shall refuse or neglect to take the faid accompt, or to joyn with the said constables in making the faid returns, the justices of the peace shall at the next quarter-jeffions to be held for that county cause every person so refusing to be indicted for such his neglect, and upon conviction impose such a fine on him as they shall judge fit, not exceeding twenty shillings; and in such case the justices of the peace shall receive a return from the said constables, that so the due payment of the faid money be not retarded by any such omission or neglect; and where the justices of peace shall suspect any returns that are brought in to be fraudulent, or shall be informed that the said constables have not made full returns, in that case the justices are to employ such other persons as they shall think fit to take an accompt of the hearths, firing places and stoves of every such parish where such neglect shall so happen.

V. And be it further enacted by the authoritie aforefaid, That the severall constables, and the faid other persons who are hereby authorized to take the accompt of the aforefaid hearths, firing-places and stoves within their particular limits as aforefaid, shall at the next quarter-jeffions, after the said twentieth day of December, to be holden for their respective counties, cities and countie-towns, deliver all such accompts in writing as they shall receive, reform or take by their own view, unto the justices of peace, in their respective quarter-jeffions of the said counties.

VI. And be it further enacted, That the said justices of peace shall cause all the faid accompts of the severall hearths, firing-places and stoves within the respective counties, cities and countie-towns aforesaid, to be inrolled by the clerk of the peace of the said respective counties, cities and countie-towns aforefaid, and also a duplicate thereof in parchment under the hands and feals of three or more of the justices of the peace of the respective counties, cities and countie-towns aforefaid, who are hereby required to sign the same, to be returned into his Majesties court of Exchequer within two months next after such accompt delivered unto them at their respective quarter-jeffions aforefaid, upon pain that the clerk of the peace of every such countie offending therein, shall forfeit to his Majesty, his heires and successors, the sum of fiftie pounds for the first month; and for the second month he shall so neglect, every such clerk of the peace shall forfeit and lose his or their place and office, and the same shall become void accordingly.

VII. And to the intent that the revenue hereby arising to his Majeſtie, may from time to time be paid into his Exchequer, with as little charge as may be; be it enacted by the authoritie aforefaid, That the ſheriff of every countie, citie or town, being a countie of itſelf, ſhall be and are hereby made collectors of and for the feveral fums arifing within their feveral and reſpective limits by virtue of this act; for which end and purpoſe the clerk of the peace of the ſaid reſpective counties, cities and countie-towns, ſhall within two months after fuch accornts delivered to the juſtices of the peace of the reſpective cities and countie-towns aforefaid, deſiuer unto the reſpective ſheriffs of the counties and places aforesaid, one other duplicate of the ſaid returns in parchment, under the hands and feals of two at the leaſt of the juſtices of the peace of the ſaid reſpective counties, cities and countie-towns, who are hereby required to ſign the fame; and the ſaid ſheriffs ſhall every half year by themſelves, or fuch other perſons as they shall reſpectively under their hands and feals appoint, and for whom they will be anſwerable, collect, gather and receive the feveral fums due and payable by virtue of this act from the feveral occupiers of the ſaid hearths, firings-places and ftoves, and upon payment thereof the ſaid ſheriffs, or fuch as they ſhall reſpectively appoint as aforefaid, thiſl give ſeveral acquittances without taking any thing for the fame, and that every fuch acquittance thiſl be a full and perfect diſcharge to every fuch perfon who thiſl pay the fame, againſt his Majeſtie, his heirs and ſucceſſors, ſo that no perfon who thiſl have fuch acquittances thiſl be moleſted, fuſed or vexed, or put to any charge in his Majeſties court of Exchequer, or elſewhere.

VIII. And be it further enacted by the authoritie aforesaid, That in cafe any perfon who is hereby charged to pay any fum or fums of moneys as aforesaid, thiſl refute or neglect to pay the fame, that then all and every fuch ſheriff and ſheriffs, and fuch other perfon or perſons as thiſl be by him or them authorized as aforefaid to collect the fame, thiſl and may levie the fame by diſtrefs and ſale of his goods, or the perfon or perſons to refuſing or ne‐glecting, rendring unto the ſaid perfon and perſons the overplus of fuch money as thiſl remain in their hands by the laid ſale after the laid ſum is diſcharged as aforefaid. And the ſaid ſheriff thiſl from time to time, within two months after the laid fum thiſl be payable by virtue of this act, make payment of all the moneys levied into his Majeſties Exchequer, with a perfect liſt of fuch perſons as thiſl make default of payment, where no diſtrefs can be found, every fuch ſheriff deducting twelve pence out of every twentie ſhillings of the payments that he thiſl ſo make by virtue of this act, and thiſl after that rate, whereof nine pence to be for the ſheriffs own uſe as a reward of his pains in collecting and returning the

fame, and three pence to be paid by the sheriff to the clerk of the peace for his pains, to be recovered by the faid clerk of the peace by action of debt, and that his Majesties officers in his faid court of Exchequer shall diſcharge all fuch perfons who paid their reſpective fums charged on them, without taking any fees for the fame, and fhall alſo iſſue out proceſs to levie the faid duties upon any the goods or lands of the perfons charged wherefover the fame fhall be found, in cafe no diſtrefs can be found to be taken according to this act, in the countie or places where the faid dutie was firſt charged.

IX. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the revenue and fum of money arifing by virtue of this act, except what is or fhall be by this act particularly otherwife diſpoſed of, fhall be duly and conſtantly paid and anſwered into his Majesties court of Exchequer, and fhall not be particularly charged or chargeable, either before it be paid into the Exchequer or after, with any gifts, grants or penſions whatſoever; and that all and every grant of any ſuch penſions, and all and every claufe of *non obſtante* there-in contained, fhall be and is hereafter declared to be utterly void; and all and every the perfons, to whom fuch grants are or fhall be paſſed, fhall be and are hereby made accomptants unto his Maſteſty, his heirs and ſucceſſors, and fhall pay back all fums of money received by pretence of fuch grant; and the court of Exchequer is hereby enjoined to iſſue out proceſs accordingly.

X. And be it further enacted by the authoritie aforesaid, That if any action, bill, plaint, ſuit or information fhall be commenced or prosecuted againſt any perfon or perfons for what he or they fhall do in purſuance or execution of this act, fuch perfon or perfons fo fuſed fhall and may plead the general iſſue not guilty, and upon iſſue joyned may give this act, and the ſpecial matter in evidence; and if the plaintiff or prosecutor fhall become non-uit, or fuſter diſcontinuance, or if a verdict paſſes againſt him, or if upon demur judgment paſſes againſt him, the defendant fhall recover treble coſts, for which there fhall be like remedie as in any cafe where coſts by law are given to the defendants.

XI. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That where any increase or decrease of fuch hearths, firing-places or ftoves fhall here after happen, that an accompt in writing of the fame fhall be had and made in like manner as the fame is directed to be firſt taken, returned and enrolled by this act, and a du‐plicate thereof ſent into the Exchequer, in fuch fort as is before directed; and from thenceforth the owner or occupier of fuch houſe where fuch decrease is, fhall be diſcharged proportionably without any further pleading in the Exchequer.

XII. Provided always, that no person or persons shall be charged, prosecuted or brought to accompt for the arrears of any duty or arrearages of revenue raised by this act, unleesse the said fuit shall commence within two years next after the same shall grow due.

XIII. Provided always, That no person who lives upon alms, and is not able to get his or her living by his or her work and labour, shall be charged or chargeable with any the duties by this act imposed; any thing herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

XIV. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That in case any two justices of the peace shall in writing under their hands yearly certifie their belief that the house, wherein any person doth inhabit within such county wherein they are justices of the peace, is not of greater value than eight shillings *per annum*, upon the full improved rent, and that neither the person so inhabiting, nor any other using the same messuage, hath, useth, or occupieth any lands or tenements of their own or others of the yearly value of eight shillings *per annum*, nor hath any lands, tenements, goods or chattles of the value of four pounds in their own possession, or in the possession of any other in trust for them, then in such case upon such certificate made to the justices of the peace of such county, at any of their quarter-sessions to be held for the same county, and allowed by them, (for which certificate and allowance no fees shall be paid) the person on whose behalf such certificate is made shall not be returned by the constables, or other persons to be afflant to them as aforesaid, and the said house is hereby for that year discharged of and from all duties by this act imposed; any thing herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

XV. Provided also, and be it enacted by the authority aforesaid, That if any person or persons, bodies politick or corporate shall at any time hereafter procure or accept of from the Kings Majestie, his heirs or successors, any pension, gift or grant for years, life, or any other estate, or any sum or sums of money, out of the revenue arising by virtue of this act, that then such person or bodies politick or corporate procuring or accepting the same shall forfeit double the value of such pension, gift or grant, the one moiety of which forfeiture shall be to the use of the parish or parishes where the said offenders be or inhabit, to be recovered by the church-wardens; the other moiety to him that will sue for the same by action of debt, bill, plaint or information.

XVI. And forasmuch as if Sir Richard Parsons baronet, and Sir Arthur Chichester knight, and dame Jane Chichester, *alias* Itchingham his wife, may not equally partake with all other your

Majefties fubjects of that free grace and favour, which, by the taking away the court of wardes in this your kingdom, is by your Majefties goodnes generally extended to all others your good fubjects here; it might leave a mark of your Majefties great difpleasure to all fucceeding ages, upon record, againft the said Sir Richard Parfons an infant not above three years of age, and the faid Sir Arthur Chichefter, and dame Jane Chichefter, *alias* Itchingham, who is not above fifteen years of age, whofe ancestors have eminently ferved your Majefties royal grandfather and father of glorious memory; may it therefore pleafe your Majefty that it be enacted, and be it enacted by your moft excellent Majefty, by and with the advice and confeit of the lords fpiritual and temporal and the commons in this prefent Parliament affembled, and by the authority of the fame, That the claufes and provifoes contained in one act of this prefent Parliament, intituled, *An Act for taking away the court of wards and liveries, and tenures in capite, and by knights service;* in which claufes and provifoes the faid Sir Richard Parfons and Sir Arthur Chichefter, and dame Jane Chichefter, *alias* Itchingham his wife, are particularly named, and every of the faid claufes and provifoes wherein the faid Sir Richard Parfons, and Sir Arthur Chichefter, and dame Jane Chichefter, *alias* Itchingham his wife, are particularly named, and every matter and thing therein contained be and hereby are repealed and nulled, and made void to all intents and purpoſes, from fuch time as the grantees of the faid wardships fhall receive fuch fatisfaction for the fame as is herein directed; and that the faid Sir Richard Parfons, and Sir Arthur Chichefter, and dame Chichefter, *alias* Itchingham his wife, and every of them, fhall and may from fuch time have and enjoy fuch and the fame benefit and advantage in as ample, large and beneficial manner to all intents, conſtructions and purpoſes whatfover, as any other of your Majefties fubjects of this your kingdom, fhall, may, might or ought to have, by your Majefties royal bounty and favour extended in the faid act generally to all your Majesties loyal fubjects of this realm; any thing in the faid claufes and provifoes, or either of them, or in the faid letters patents therein mentioned, or otherwife, to the contrary hereof notwithstanding.

XVII. And be it further enacted by the authority aforefaid, That out of the firſt moneys which fhall be raifed by virtue of this prefent act, the full ſum of twenty thoufand pounds be taken and applied to the fatisfaction of the feveral officers of the court of wards, and others, who in the profit of their offices do receive particular loſs, damage or hindrance, by taking away of the faid court of wards, and for fatisfying of Robert Boyl and Daniel O Neale, eſquires, for their reſpective wardships of the faid

Sir Richard Parfons baronet, and dame Jane Chichester, alias Itchingham, the said sum of twenty thousand pounds, to be disposed and distributed amongst the said officers and others as aforesaid, their executors or administrators, in full compensation of their said losses and damages, and for satisfying the two wardships before-mentioned, in such manner and according to such proportions to be respectively divided amongst them, as the lord lieutenant or other chief governour or governors and council of this kingdom shall think fit, who by authority of this act, are to give warrants for the payment thereof accordingly.

XVIII. And be it enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the said sum of twenty thousand pounds *sterl.* or any other sum or sums whatsoever, shall not be levied upon this kingdom, or the subjects therein, or any of the counties, cities, towns, lands, tenements or hereditaments, by way of subsidy, affement, poll-money, or any other ways or means whatsoever, under pretence of giving satisfaction or a just compensation to the said officers who suffer loss and damage by taking away the said court of wards, as aforesaid; any thing in this present act, or in any other act or acts passed in this present Parliament in any wise to the contrary notwithstanding.

XIX. Provided, That this act or any thing therein contained shall not extend to charge any private oven or kilne within any of the houses hereby charged, or any hearth or stove within the fite of any colledge, hospital or alms-house.

XX. Provided, That the payments and duties hereby charged shall be charged onely on the occupier for the time being of such hearth or stove, dwelling in such house, edifice, or whereto such hearth or stove shall be belonging, his executors or administrators, and not on the landlord who let or demised the same, his heirs, executors or assigns.

XXI. Provided, That no person or persons indebted for any the duties aforesaid, shall thereby be privileged as a debtor or debtors to his Majesty, his heirs or successors, to sue any person or persons in the court of Exchequer, or to assign any debt to his Majesty, his heirs or successors, towards satisfaction of the same.

The following is the Official Summary
of the 1665 Act, 17 & 18 Charles II, Chap. xviii:

1. Revenue not duly answered by reason of defects in statute 14 & 15 C. II, 17 and neglect of officers. Persons making returns of hearths may be examined on oath.
2. Occupiers of houses to forfeit 4s. for every hearth omitted in the accounts. Constables and assistants making default to forfeit 40s.
3. Further allowance, not exceeding 3d. per pound, to clerk of the peace.
4. Chief governors and council may appoint officers to collect this duty, inspect the rolls, certificates and returns, and enter houses in the day time with constable and assistants and search whether any more hearths than formerly returned, and if any variance certify to clerk of the peace. Duplicate to be returned into Exchequer. Such officers to have power to collect said revenue.
5. Officers, after notice of appointment to the sheriff, to levy at the place where due; by distress and sale upon refusal, with assistance of constable in day-time. Charges of distress not to exceed fourth part of the duty and arrears. Penalty 40s. upon constable &c. refusing or neglecting.
6. Occupiers of hearths not to be charged two years after the duty due, nor for arrears not appearing on record in Exchequer. Officers formerly appointed to collect discharged. Said duty payable into Exchequer in Hilary term yearly or thirty days after.
7. Collectors first to give security and take oath for the due execution; not to exact fees on pain of disability and treble damages, to sign acquittances without fee. Persons fraudulently stopping up or concealing hearths to pay double. Differences to be determined by adjoining justices or the magistrate. They and all officers to assist the persons collecting.
8. Allowances to clerks of the peace [as in 1662 Act].
9. Till such officers appointed the former may continue to act.
10. Chief governors and council to appoint persons to execute this act; other persons discharged.
11. Clause in former act concerning houses exempted upon certificate of two justices shall extend to widows only; repealed as to all other persons.

12. Houses within precinct of cathedral or collegiate church not discharged.

13. Ovens in bakers' houses, taverns, inns &c., and kilns where grain dried for sale, deemed public and charged; others private.

14. Said duty payable tenth January yearly; returns delivered by occupiers to constable or other officer before tenth November yearly; constables and assistants to give notice by third November.

15. Houses having no fixed hearth with chimneys chargeable with two hearths.

16. Sir Henry Tichburn as a compensation for his eminent services and losses in the late rebellion and for being deprived of the wardship of Nicholas Plunket to have £2,000 out of said duty payable in a year.

SEVENTEENTH CENTURY PROCLAMATIONS CONCERNING
HEARTH MONEY

(from *Bibliotheca Lindesiana*)

770. 15 August 1666. Appointing Collectors: Sir Richard Gethings, Sir Peter Pett, Denny Muschamp, John Stepney and Joseph Dean, appointed receivers of the hearth-money. Former collectors discharged.

780. 21 March 1666-7. The hearth-money does not come in owing to concealment of hearths and obstinacy of persons of quality who will not admit inspectors, the combination against distress and the connivance of magistrates. All arrears from 24 June 1665 must be paid at once to the deputies No. 770. Magistrates and officers to assist deputies. This to be proclaimed within 16 days after receipt.

801. 26 August 1669. [For assessing hearth-money where there are no hearths] Any house with no chimney or hearths to be counted as having two hearths (after 24 March 1667-8) until it has one or more fixed hearths with a chimney or chimneys (Cites Act: This clause is published that all may know).

806. 21 March 1669-70. John Stone, Samuel Richardson, Richard Bucknal and Thomas Breedon appointed collectors of hearth-money from 25 December 1668.

874. 5 February 1676-7. Certificates of exemption have been granted too freely. Special Justices of Peace are now nominated for each county who alone have the power of granting exemptions. William Hill, Sir James Shaen, Wm. Rider, Wm. Muschamp, Edward Richbill, Laurence Stanyan, John Gourney and Thomas Sheridan are commissioners for hearth-money.

925. 15 January 1682-3. Recites provisions under which exemption from hearth-money may be granted. A list of those authorized to grant exemptions. Francis E. of Longford, Lemuel Kingston, William Dickinson, Wm. Strong and Robert Bridges to be commissioners for hearth-money. All money due on hearths &c. on 10 January to be paid to them.

934. 22 August 1684. Complaints are made that some magistrates obstruct revenue officers in collecting hearth-money, excises, licences; will not punish persons who rescue distresses legally levied, and take insolvent recognizances for the appearance of those they do commit. All magistrates etc., are in future to give vigorous and hearty assistance to revenue officers on pain of disaffection.

977. 11 April 1687. Houses of less value than 8s. are exempt from hearth-money on obtaining a certificate. A list of those empowered to grant certificates to poor widows is added [See No. 1007]. The duties are to be paid to the authorized collectors. Ten days notice to be given at the house before distress is made.

1007. 28 December 1688. Appointing commissioner for exempting from hearth tax.

1264. 7 July 1692. Arrears of hearth-money and of quit-rent due at Lady Day or Easter exonerated and discharged.

1286. 3 May 1693. Regulations for exemptions from hearth-money and list of persons entitled to grant it.

1300a. 3 March 1936--4. Concerning exemptions from hearth-money. Not found.

1306. 22 February 1694-5. A list of exemptions from hearth-money and of those entitled to grant it.

1314. 11 February, 1695-6. Owing to the absence of the persons nominated in proclamation 3 May 1653, No. 1286, no exemptions were given. 26 persons are nominated to grant exemptions.

1366. 27 June 1698. Cites proclamation 3 March 1693-4, No. 1300A. The persons entitled to grant exemptions in Antrim are added to.

1411. 29 December 1699. Recites particulars of those exempted from hearth-money. Appoints persons in every county &c. to grant exemptions, who are to be careful not to exceed the limits set down, Magistrates etc. are to assist the collectors. Duplicates of exemptions to be sent to Quarter Sessions.
