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PREFACE

THE Muniment Room of the Marquess of Ormonde at Kilkenny Castle contains what is, since the destruction of the Public Record Office, Dublin, in 1922, the largest single collection of mediaeval deeds and records now extant in Ireland. These are of a miscellaneous nature and of both public and private character, and range from royal commissions, letters patent and grants, down to feudal charters of the Butlers and others, and to the leases and conveyances of insignificant tenants and burgesses. They include some proceedings of manor courts, notably of the Liberty of Tipperary,¹ lists of royal service, numbers of Butler rent-rolls, a considerable mass of monastic charters, such as those of Kells in Ossory, Holy Cross, Jerpoint and other religious houses in counties Tipperary and Kilkenny, proceedings of Bishops' courts and other ecclesiastical matter. How all this mass of miscellaneous deeds, for the most part very carefully preserved, came into possession of the House of Ormonde it is unnecessary here to enquire. Suffice it is to say that Ireland should be grateful that it has escaped the fate of many other collections and survived to this day.

From this material, ranging in date from about 1180 to the reign of Elizabeth, and covering the two counties mentioned above and parts of the adjacent lands, an enormous addition can be made to our existing knowledge of mediaeval Irish history, of English government as directed from Westminster and Dublin, of municipal history, of the workings of the manorial and feudal systems here, of the Church and monastic system, of the relations of the Crown with the Anglo-Irish barons and of these with Irish chiefs. On this latter obscure question much light is thrown by the various indentures and treaties made with Irish 'captains of their nations' by the Earls of Ormond and others. On these and other matters the Ormond deeds contain "finds" of the sort thrilling to historical researchers².

On the importance of these deeds for genealogical, topographical and linguistic studies no emphasis is necessary. They contain a bundant evidence for the medley of races and languages, French, Flemish, Welsh, Gaelic, Norse and Saxon which obtained in mediaeval Ireland. Much might be deduced as to Gaelic political and social institutions which survived under the Anglo-Norman hegemony, attested by such latinized forms as "theodum," "betagius," etc.

So far I have been speaking only of the mediaeval portion of the Ormond records. Actually the Muniment Room at Kilkenny Castle contains family and State records which in date come up to modern times. The portion which begins with the 16th century and con-

tinues to the 18th has been calendared by the Historical Manuscripts Commission of Great Britain ³.

My work as editor is confined to the deeds and documents, for the most part written on parchment, which begin about 1170 and end where the Reports of the Historical Manuscripts Commission (just quoted) begin, that is roughly in the middle years of Queen Elizabeth's reign. They may be described as mediæval in the sense that the Middle Ages lasted a century longer in Ireland than in England. To draw a dividing line is not easy, for the contents of the Kilkenny Muniment room are of a large and miscellaneous order and have never received careful classification, order or dating. Hence it is not at present clear where that dividing line can be drawn or when it will be possible to say that all the documents anterior to the Reports of the [British] Historical Manuscripts Commission have been finally dealt with. But it is hoped that in the volumes of this present "Calendar of Ormond Deeds" everything of importance up to the reign of Queen Elizabeth will be ultimately described or recorded.

The deeds which will be calendared in this and succeeding volumes are stored in some seventy drawers in the Muniment room and range in date from the early Norman period of Irish history to the middle or end of Elizabeth's reign. They had been put into some rough chronological order, but this was not complete, and hence it will be found as in this present volume that deeds out of their period may have to be entered later as Addenda. Again, as might be expected, a late insepimus, exemplification or recitation of an earlier deed will bring to light records of much importance. An interesting example of this occurs in Deed 863 of this present volume (Addenda) which takes us back from Henry IV to a valuable, and I believe so far unknown, number of charters to the Pypards and others of the earliest influx of Anglo-Norman settlers.

The mediæval records of the House of Ormond have to all intents and purposes remained unpublished and uncalendared, nor has any real investigation been made of them. No printed or manuscript catalogue of them exists. Generally speaking, their importance has never been made known. Carte in his *Life of the Great Duke of Ormonde* ⁴ consulted and occasionally quotes a specimen of the early Kilkenny records. Graves and Prim's *History of the Cathedral of St. Canice's Cathedral, Kilkenny*, and Carrigan's *History of the Diocese of Ossory* do the same, but only casually. References to some of the deeds appear in the volumes of the *Calendar of the Carew Manuscripts*. Two complete pieces of work have been done in portions of the deeds. The "Charters of the Abbey of Duiske or Graiguenamanagh" have been most excellently edited by Lady Constance Butler and the late Dr. J. H. Bernard in the *Proceedings of the Royal Irish Academy* (1918). A rare and valuable *Roll of the Council of Ireland* for 1392, preserved in the Muniment Room, Kilkenny Castle, has been edited for the Rolls Series by the Rev. James Graves. To these I may add that one of the

treasures of this room, the so-called "Red Book of Ormond," an early rent-book of the Butler Earls, is being edited by Mr. Newport B. White for the Irish MSS. Commission.

So much for printed work. In the troubled times in Ireland, 1921-22, the Earl of Ossory had a large part of these deeds deposited in the London Public Record Office in the custody of the Historical MSS. Commission. Mr. H. Berry there calendared some four hundred and fifty of them, of miscellaneous date.⁵ The work stopped there however, and the manuscripts were returned to Kilkenny. In 1930, after the formation of the Irish Manuscripts Commission, the Historical Manuscripts Commission of Great Britain generously placed this collection of transcripts at the disposal of the Irish body, and they form the basis of this first volume of Ormond Deeds. I have indicated the deeds calendared by Mr. Berry with a B. ; the expert value of his work goes without saying, and especially useful are his topographical notes. For the remaining deeds I take full responsibility.

It only remains to indicate the scope and method of my work as editor. The less important deeds are summarised in all their essential details with witnesses and date. For the earlier deeds dating is often difficult and many of later origin are totally undated, but I have tried to give each deed its exact or approximate year. Students of these documents will no doubt be able to date many of the uncertain ones more accurately. When a deed is of wider interest I give a full translation, or when I think the text itself is worthy of reproducing I give it in full. This latter applies to charters of abbeys or towns, interesting proceedings of courts, royal patents and grants, such as were the foundation of Butler greatness, treaties with Irish chiefs, and other matter that seemed especially note-worthy. Especially do the early land-grants of King John and Henry III seem memorable in this way.

Common form and unnecessary verbiage are naturally reduced or eliminated. Difficulties arise with regard to surnames ; ' filius ' in the earlier stages may be translated ' son of ' ; later it stands for ' fitz ' and implies a permanent patronymic. The exclusive use of Latin at first and then of Norman-French complicates things. ' Pincerna Hibernie ' is the usual title for the head of the Butlers at first, and I translate " Butler of Ireland " ; from about 1270 I adopt the form " le Botiller " as convenient and correct. A name such as ' De Fraxineto ' changes to the French ' De la freigne ' ; " De Sancto Albino " may be " De St. Aubyn " and finally becomes " Tobin. " The same man may be " Albus, " " White, " " the White " Canutus ; may be " le Hore, " etc.

The condition of the particular manuscript is only referred to when it makes proper transcript or legibility difficult. The sign . . . serves to indicate where a portion is illegible, torn or defaced in various ways. Where a reading is in doubt I give what appears to be the original, or add a note.

The colonial population to which those deeds relate were at first conversant with French, Latin and an early form of English, and

many with Welsh, for Cymric names are common among them; some probably with Flemish. The survival of the older Norse or Ostman population can be deduced. Very soon the settlers began to know some Irish, through intercourse with the native race among whom they dwelt. This diversity of race and speech is reflected in those deeds; it may be left to scholars to explore them for such evidence, in actual words, phrases, personal names and place-names. As a student of medieval Irish history, I have emphasised many such points of interest; by quoting rare Latin words or latinized Gaelic words such as "theodum" (tuath), "bother," etc. The existence of Latin, French and English side by side can be seen where "Ruffus" or "Coccus" for a man becomes a surname "le Rede" or "the Rede"; sometimes the latter occurs in the midst of the Latin text and I give it in this Anglo-saxon form.

The seals are numerous and of very great interest, but I have in general only stated where the seal survives or is in good condition. The study of them must be left to experts with more time at their disposal.

The greater part of the deeds are in Latin. A number are in Norman-French. From about 1350 some English begins to appear and becomes of course more common in the 15th and early 16th centuries. Among those that make up this first volume of the Calendar I find no use made of the Irish language, or any document of literary character; all are purely legal and practical.

The Irish nation in general and students of our medieval history in particular owe a debt of thanks to the present Earl of Ossory for his public spirit in allowing these records to be made known. They concern not only the illustrious house of Ormond but numbers of other families, Norman, Welsh and Gaelic, whose surnames still survive among us or who if they have disappeared have left their mark on southern Ireland. As the Gaelic side of Irish history has suffered for lack of evidence, it is notable that here we have much material for that side, notably in the charters or deeds of Gaelic kings and chiefs, such as Donal Mór O'Brien, King of Thomond at the time of the Norman invasion. The charters of the invaders themselves, of which some appear here for the first time, add again to another important and fascinating side of national history.

It was in 1930 that I was commissioned by the Irish Manuscripts Commission to visit Lord Ossory and seek his permission to have this mass of documents examined and calendared. That permission was most graciously given and since then his Lordship has used the greatest courtesy and kindness in aiding the completion of this work, for which as editor I express my sincerest thanks. I wish also to express to the Librarian and Staff of Trinity College, Dublin, my appreciation of the way in which they placed every possible facility in my way for pursuing the work. Also to Miss Hilda McGuire, B.A., my assistant in this work, my appreciation of her help, and the zeal and care she has put into the task of bringing this volume to a conclusion.

and all the land of Oquirc which is in that part of the river in which Tachgumeni stands, and all the appurtenances thereof. And he and his heirs shall have twenty-five knights' fees if they are there, and what shall be wanting the said Earl William shall make up in Collacta, to hold by free service of five knights to him and his heirs of the said Earl William and Isobel his wife and their heirs in fee and heritage. Moreover we grant and confirm to the said Adam and his heirs the grant which the said Earl William made to them of the half town of Achebo and the half cantred of land in which that town stands as O'Kelli Deremod held it in Ossory, to hold by free service of five knights of the said Earl William, etc., in lands, water, woods, plain, etc., and with all liberties and free customs, even as the charter of the said Earl Richard, father of the same Isabella, which the said Adam has of him, testifies."

" Know all present and to come that I, Geoffrey son of Robert, for the sake of my soul and that of my ancestors and heirs have founded a certain house of religion in my land in Ireland in the land of Ossory in the town which is called Kenelis [Kells] to the honour of God and His glorious Mother. And this foundation I have made by counsel and consent, and for the soul of my lord William the Marshal who is chief lord of the aforesaid country and who has confirmed by his charter the above said house and all my donations and grants made to it. This also I have done by the will and consent of my wife Eva who has confirmed the said house as far as she is concerned. Therefore I have given

and granted as far as I am concerned to the said house and to the Prior and regular canons who serve or shall serve God there, all churches, chapels, tithes, oblations and all other manner of ecclesiastical benefices proceeding or likely to proceed from my land in Offathith and particularly the chapel of my castle of Kells, with all its offerings and benefices, and tithes of all my rents and profits which I or my bailiffs can demand, and with tithes of all my expenses (*expensarum*), wheresoever they are made, whether in chamber or kitchen or elsewhere. And also the tithes of all other of my goods which ought to be tithed. Especially have I given and granted to the said Prior and canons three carucates of land between the town of Kells and the town (*villa*) of Kilri with all its meadows and other appurtenances. Also the town of Baliscallan with its lands, serfs (*nativi*) and all other appurtenances. Also three other carucates of land beyond the water of Righi around the vill which is called Rathalwi towards the north with its ecclesiastical benefices and other appurtenances. Also the town of Killini and the church in the same place with one carucate of land with its serfs and other appurtenances. Also all ecclesiastical benefices of Pengran, Bali-macpistan, Baliucorcatha and Rathamelan and the mill which is in the same land near my new town on the water of Righi. And for the support of the same mill ten acres of land which are near it. Also the land of Distermoholmoc with its churches, chapels and all liberties and appurtenances. Also a burgh in the burgh of Kilkenny which is opposite the house of the Palmer with its houses and appurtenances. Also all fisheries which are or may be between my mill which is before the gate of my castle at Kells and the land of Hunsnach. And that they may enclose and make the said fisheries and their mill ponds in my land beneath my mill towards the north wheresoever they wish or are able, and their mills wherever they are made beneath (*desubtus*) the church of St. Mary I grant and confirm to them. And whoever of my men shall wish to do so shall fully and freely grind in their mills, nor shall it be lawful for any of my men to bring to law those who wish to grind there or in any way to prevent them. I have also granted to the same canons my common pasture complete (*per totum*), apart from meadows, sown lands and enclosed places (*septa*). And that they shall be free from following "Houthorn" and so shall all those who are under their juris-

diction (*de suo manupastu*), but other tenants of theirs shall follow it according to the custom and law of country (*provincia*). And those who do not follow as they ought shall be punished according to the law of the country, and the pleas and fines (*mercie*) resulting, as well as all pleas and fines of their men and servants, belonging to me, shall be theirs (*placita . . . spectantia ad me sua sint*). And they shall also have the free election of the Prior when a Prior is dead, provided however that he be chosen from the same house or from Bodmin, according as the writing made between the said churches and sealed with my seal testifies.

All these which are aforesaid and whatsoever else they have rightly obtained or in future may obtain and all manner of liberties or immunities which it becomes a house of religion to have and which I can confer I have granted to the said church and Prior and canons and confirmed by my seal, in pure and perpetual alms, freely and peacefully, free and quit of every secular exaction and service which may be expressed by mouth or conceived by heart."

He is to have twenty five knights' fees within those lands, if there ; if wanting there, grantor will perform it to them in Collacerta by free service of five knights ; half the vill of Achebo [Aghaboe, Queen's county], and the half cantred of land in which the vill lies, as Dermot O Kelli held it in Ossory, by free service of five knights. To have and to hold of Earl William and Isabel, his wife, as by the charter of Earl Richard, his wife's father, which Adam de Hereford had of him.

But the said G., exceeding his authority and calling nobody, denied the right of the Prior of Kells to the presentation, saying that the church was not vacant by the resignation of the said Walter and that case should be settled before the justices. Memorandum that Matthew son of Griffin who formerly held the manor of Kenles in Fotherid [Kellistown in Forth] gave to the Prior and convent of Kells and his successors for ever the advowson of the church of Kellistown, and Walter de Langeport who was then rector resigned the same church into the hands of William Chaunuior who was then bishop of Leighlin, and the prior and convent presented the said Walter to the same church who was then admitted and instituted by the said bishop, and afterwards by the consent of same Walter the prior and convent obtained from the bishop a grant of the same church to their own proper use and the chapter of Leighlin confirmed this on condition that for the life of the same Walter they should take from the same church, by the hands of Walter, every year half a mark, and that after the death of Walter they should hold the whole church to their own use, which pension Walter paid for some years in recognition of their right and then he took the habit of a monk, and the said prior and convent entered and held the

church from the feast of St. John the Baptist, A.D. MCCLIII [January 25, 1254 N.S.] unto the feast of the Conversion of St. Paul next following, and to the death of the said Matthew who gave them the above advowson. His brother Raymond succeeded to him and held the manor and then came Agatha, widow of Matthew, and sued for the advowson of the church against the Prior as her dowry, and presented it to Walter, son of William de Dene, and in the court of the Liberty of Carlow claimed the said advowson against the said Prior by a judgment on a writ of Darrein Presentment, so that he [Walter de Dene] being presented to the living expelled the said Prior. But this judgment as erroneous was set aside at the command of the King and was revoked by William Malerbe, seneschal of Roger, Earl of Norfolk, [cf. Deeds 60, 67] and the said Prior and convent were restored to possession of the said church and after it had been set to farm for a term of years to Master Geoffrey de Seynligier the Prior re-entered on the same and held it for a long time. Then Clarice, daughter of Gilbert, son of Griffin, who claimed hereditary right in the said manor with the advowson, in her liege viduity after the death of Henry Kernet her second husband [cf. Deeds 57 and 58] surrendered all her right in the said advowson to the same Prior. Then after the death of John Laules, her third husband, she in her liege viduity gave her right in a third part of the said manor to William de Dene [cf. *C.D.I.* III. p. 294] and to Richard de la Rokele, Justiciar of Ireland, also a third part, and she kept the third part to herself. Then afterwards, by the counsel of the same William and Richard, by Writ of Right she claimed the advowson against the said Prior in the court of the Liberty of Carlow but when the case was pending the parties came to an agreement.

The same Clarice remitted and quitclaimed for herself and her heirs to the said Prior and convent all her right in the advowson forever and there they made an end to the case [*finem levarunt*]. [Date between 1227 and 1252.]

[This seems to be a continuation of 71. Probably the whole is a certificate of Nicholas de Chevers, bishop of Leighlin, made about 1289-90 in pursuance of the King's mandate, (see *C.D.I.* III., pp. 251-258 and 294).]

Then when the said Walter, who formerly was parson of the said church [? son of William de Dene] at the presentation of the said Agatha, was removed by judges legally appointed and had declared himself lawfully appointed before other judges sent by the Apostolic see, it was agreed between him and the Prior and convent that he should hold the said church from the Prior and convent at farm paying yearly three marks of silver. And after he had paid this pension for some time he tacitly made his resignation to Fromund le Brun,* then Chancellor of Ireland. He then succeeded his brother, William de Dene, junior, in a third part of the said manor and fraudulently presented to the church but Fromund expelled the said Prior and convent from the advowson of the church and held it all his life. Walter died, and his brother Thomas succeeded him, to whom succeeded Reginald his son and heir who now is and was then under age and in the wardship of Stephen de Fulburne, Justiciar of Ireland, who on the death of Fromund le Brun by right of the wardship presented Master Adam de Fulburne, his brother, who was not ordained within a year, and afterwards the said guardian presented a certain Andrew, but Reginald, when he came of age, presented William le Clere against the protest and claim of the said Prior and convent.

Letters patent of Edward III with great seal.

Although it is found by inquisition which we had made by John de Ellerker, our Escheator of Ireland, which is recorded in the Chancery of Ireland, that it is not to our damage or prejudice or that of any other, if we grant to the Prior of Kells in Ossory that he may annex the vicariate of the church of St. Patrick of Kenlys [Kellistown] with all its chapels and appurtenances to the rectory of the same and hold it forever to his use and that of his successors, except in case the Bishop of Leighlin shall wish to exact something from the same, by a certain fine which the Prior has made to us we have granted to him that he may annex the said vicariate to the rectory of that church and hold it to himself and his successors for ever.

Kells Priory.

A skin described in dorso as "coppie of old dedes and grauntes to Kells Priory" made apparently about 1350. It repeats four of the deeds in "Acta et processus Ecclesie de Kenles" described above. It then gives a description of the boundaries of the church of Kenles in Forth [Co. Carlow] and also the boundaries of the parish of Kenles [Kellistown] as declared by natives of the district.


"This is the boundary of the church of Kenles in Forth O'Nolan with its chapels, namely, Moethail, Finnore, Villa Laurencii Boscher, Balibethill. The parish of the chapel of Balibethill [written in above line: *sen* or *seu-etrā*] according to the testimony of some born and dwelling there, namely, Malachy mac Chiemain, Dermot O'Nolan (Dermicii yNullain) and Taig Uir Onolan and Richard son of the carpenter, who, being duly sworn, say that it goes from the ford of the Black House by all that stream keeping the right hand by the shrubbery (*virgultus*) of Sgeartan and by the wood to Ranaldstown holding the right hand to the wood as far as the water of Burin, and by all that water to the rabbit warren or *coniger* leaving that on the right hand by the whole "Gruna" even to Bothir na hairdbue [? hairdbone] and following the Gruna to the stream near Rathbrog, and by all the stream of the weir to the ford of the Gruna in Cuillter and by the Gruna from the ford leaving Rathseissin on the left side and by the slender (*gracilis*) Gruna even to Feuda fabri and by the Gruna even to the stream to the ford of the Black House."

"The Parish of Kenles with the chapels of Moethail and Finnore and Baile Boisere according to the testimony of Sir Richard "Rici," vicar of Tristeldermot and Philip, "clericus," of the same town. It begins from Baille Sgueraigh by the royal road to the slender (*gracilis*) Gruna near Baile in Unraith, and by the Gruna to the ford of Baile aysse [or: ayffe] and thence to the ford of the white Gruna and thence to Culuntrach, leaving that on the right hand and thence to the Burren and beyond the river to the town of Laurence Boissere leaving that on the right

hand to the Gruna and by that to the road and by that to the ford of the Grange and thence to Baile Sgueraigh."

*The above grants and lawsuits may be illustrated by a pedigree kindly supplied by Dr. Goddard H. Orpen.

In confirmation of his view, he points out that there is not a Smithstown near Castle Eve, while there is one in Tullaherin and another in Thomastown parish. Canon Carrigan supposes "Vill del Yf" to have been in this neighbourhood."

“ Alexander, Bishop, servant of the servants of God, to his dear sons the abbots and convents of the Cistercian order in the realm of England and places under the dominion of the same. Whereas, when a tenth of ecclesiastical property was by our predecessor Innocent granted to the King of France in aid of the Holy Land, your houses in the realm of France were exempted by the good will of the same king, we, wishing to make you a like indulgence, grant that ye shall not be held to contribute toward a similar tenth granted by the Holy See to the King of England in aid of the Holy Land nor be compelled to pay the same.

Edward, eldest son of the King of England, grants to Richard de la Rokele [de Rupella] for his homage and service and for three hundred marks paid, all the cantred of Omany in Connacht, excepting twenty librates of land which the said Richard has of the gift of the King our father and twenty librates of land which he has of the gift of lord John fitz Geoffrey in the same cantred, and excepting twenty librates of land which Jordan de Excestre has of the King in the same cantred. To have and to hold to him and his heirs of us and our heirs freely quietly peacefully, etc. with all liberties and free customs pertaining to the same cantred. Paying therefor to us and our heirs each year at our Exchequer of Dublin for each villate of land which he has there a hundred shillings, half at Easter and half at Michaelmas. And doing to us and our heirs the service of one knight's fee for all service, custom and demand. We have granted also to the same Richard that he and his heirs forever shall hold the said cantred free of all pleas and suits of sheriffs, and all other our bailiffs and ministers, and that they shall have in that cantred the return of our writs and the plea *vetitum namium* and all pleas which pertain to the sheriff. And that he and his heirs shall respond or shall answer for the above said rent at our Exchequer by the hand of his bailiffs, namely for the hundred shillings of rent as above for each villate, and all other debts pertaining to that cantred. So that no sheriff, bailiff or minister of ours shall

enter that cantred to make any summons or attachments or intrude in any of those matters which belong to that cantred except for defect of the said Richard or his heirs or bailiffs. Saving to us and our heirs the pleas of writs which ought to be and are wont to be pleaded before our justices, and other pleas of our crown. We have granted also to Richard that he and his heirs may for the preservation of their lands build a castle in the said cantred and have markets, fairs and warrens in whatever places they think fit, and have all the liberties and free customs pertaining to such markets, etc., unless such markets and fairs be of harm to neighbouring markets and fairs.

and bishops, whenever they come to your monasteries and houses are lovingly admitted and entertained, nevertheless the same prelates and diocesans, on pretext of letters of the Holy See in which it is stated that pecuniary proxies shall be paid to them by exempt as well as non-exempt houses, in spite of any indulgence granted to the Cistercians or any others and contrary to the indulgence which the Holy See granted to you and your houses, do presume to exact and extort the same from you under threat of excommunication. Therefore at the request of [*torn . . .* Johannes de Tolet] Cardinal priest of St. Laurence in Lucina, we ordain and grant that ye shall not be held to pay such pecuniary proxies to our legates and envoys on pretext of such letters of the Holy See mentioned above, or to the said archbishops and abbots, and also that all sentences of excommunication as are mentioned above shall be utterly null and void.

For which fine as far as concerns us we have pardoned him and his men all robberies and felonies etc. as above up to the aforesaid day and have granted them our firm peace, provided that in future they conduct themselves faithfully in our said land.

his heirs—the said Dean and chapter have bound themselves and their successors by their letters patent under their common seal and ours to provide forever four suitable and honest priests to the above said church to celebrate masses forever daily or on special occasions for the benefit of Edmund and his heirs. And in case this provision of priests fail or cease, they have granted for themselves and their successors that they are bound to Edmund & his heirs in forty pounds of silver as often as they cease to provide, together with the supplying of the omitted ministry and perpetual continuance of the provision of priests as above, by their above-said letters.

We the above-said William by counsel and consent of our Dean and chapter have confirmed and ratified for us and our successors all the above-named grants and obligations in all their parts. For confirming which we have had appended to these presents our seal and that of the Dean and chapter.”

“ Edward, King of England, has inspected certain letters patent which he has had made under the great seal of Ireland in these words. Edward, King of England etc. We have inspected a certain indenture between Edmund le Botiller on one hand and Roger Outlawe, Prior of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in Ireland and the brothers of the same, on the other, now in the Chancery of Ireland, the tenor of which is that on Thursday the feast of the Ascension [May 2] 1320 it is agreed between Edmund le Botiller and Roger Outlawe that the said prior Outlawe and the brothers do grant for themselves and their successors that they will find four chaplains suitable and sufficient in the church of the B.V.M. in Balygaueran [Gowran] to celebrate mass there every day and to pray for the souls of the said Edmund and Johanna, formerly his wife, and the ancestors, heirs, issue, brothers and sisters of the said Edmund at the charge of the said Hospital forever. Provision

to be made for filling the number of these four when one dies or becomes insufficient, on pain of a penalty of a fine to the said Edmund and his heirs. The said Edmund and his wife, etc. are to be remembered in all prayers and masses there. Edmund undertakes for himself and his heirs to protect the said Prior and brothers and their tenants in all places wherever they may personally be against all men saving the lord King, his men and tenants, in witness of which each side appended their seals at Kilmainham." "We have also inspected another writing on the advowson of half the church of St. Mary at Gowran which was made by writ of *quare impedit* between Lord Edmund le Botiller, plaintiff, and the Dean and chapter of St. Canice's, Kilkenny, defendants, and is now in our chancery in the following words. Let it be known by these presents that when a plea was brought forward in the court of King Edward [II] before the Justices of the King's Bench at Dublin concerning the above advowson which the Dean and chapter detain to their own use, we, John called Lupus, Dean of St. Canice's, and the chapter of the same, by the advice and assent of William, Bishop of Ossory, bind ourselves and our successors to the said Edmund and his heirs to find and maintain four suitable priests at our expense in the said church of B.V.M. at Gowran to celebrate Mass for the souls of the said Edmund and Johanna and their sons and daughters and for Thomas le Botiller, the brother of Edmund, and his sons and daughters and for the souls of their ancestors and successors living and dead and for the souls of Theobald Walter the first Butler of Ireland and of Theobald II, Theobald III, and Theobald IV, the father of Theobald V and the said Edmund. Also for the souls of Johanna, mother of the said Theobald and Edmund, and of John, Richard, Gilbert, Nicholas and James, brothers of the said Edmund and Matilda and Johanna sisters of the said Edmund, also the souls of John son of Geoffrey, John son of John and Richard son of John, sons of the said John son of Geoffrey and uncles of the said Edmund and for the souls of all other of their ancestors and successors forever.

And if we or our successors fail or cease to provide the said four priests or any of them we bind ourselves to pay to the said Edmund and his heirs 40 lbs. of silver on due notice and warning being given and within a certain date. We also bind ourselves and our successors to replace the said priests or any of them for any

moral fault or impotence through age, at the demand of the said Edmund and his heirs and this under pain of secular and ecclesiastical penalty.

Letters patent of Edward III in his 41st year confirming two deeds then in the Chancery of Ireland.

The first, dated Kilkenny, November 20, 1312, is a grant made by John Lupus, dean of St. Kanice's, Kilkenny, and the chapter of the same, with the assent of William, bishop of Ossory, following

on a judgment in the King's Bench at Dublin, regarding the advowson of the church of the B.V.M. at Gowran. They bind themselves to Edmund le Botiller and his heirs to find and maintain for ever four suitable priests at their own expense in the church of the B.V.M. at Gowran to celebrate mass and to pay for the souls of Edmund, Johanna his wife and their ancestors and successors etc. [as in 470].

The second deed is an indenture between Edmund le Botiller and Roger Outlawe, prior of Kilmainham, and the brothers of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem, dated on Thursday in the feast of the Ascension [May 2], 1320 at Kilmainham, by which the said prior and brothers bind themselves to provide four suitable and sufficient chaplains to celebrate mass, etc., in the church of the B.V.M. at Gowran for ever and to pray for the souls of the said Edmund and Johanna, formerly his wife and their ancestors and heirs. The said Edmund undertakes for himself and his heirs to protect the said prior and brothers and their men and tenants against all men saving the King, his men and tenants.

The King has confirmed the above at the request of James le Botiller, Earl of Ormond.

So that when the said Adam is summoned by Sir Edmund to come to his aid with his force (*ou pouer*) the latter shall bear the costs of leading Adam's force in the parts of Wexford until he comes wherever Sir Edmund be and until he returns to his house and abode in the parts of Wexford; and if Adam come to Sir Edmund by his command, and in no other manner, that then when he has come where Sir Edmund is he shall be received at the cost of the latter with five draught horses on each

occasion (*oue synk trahinans en tout eschoson*). And for the receipt of arms aforesaid and for his sojourn (*demore*) Sir Edmund binds himself and his heirs and executors to the said Adam in a hundred marks sterling of pure debt to be paid at certain terms, viz. twenty marks at Michaelmas next to come and twenty marks at Easter next ensuing and so from year to year and term to term until the said hundred marks be fully paid.

“ On Saturday next after the feast of the Invention of the Holy Cross, viz., on the 10th day of May anno Domini MCCCXV and in the 8th year of King Edward, son of King Edward, at Dublin: it was agreed between Sir John de Hanstede, knight, on one part and Robert de Notyngam, citizen of Dublin, on the other, that whereas the said John has released for himself and his heirs and quitclaimed to the said Robert and his heirs all his right and claim in a water-mill in Lotereleston in county Dublin and in a moiety of Lucan with its appurtenances in the same county, which John lately recovered against Robert in the Bench at Dublin before Richard de Exonia and his fellows, the King’s Justices there, the said Robert for himself and his heirs wills and grants that from the time when he or his heirs or assigns shall peacefully obtain and recover to their own use all issues and profits of the said mill and a moiety of the said manor, with their appurtenances in any way arising, without any impediment intervening as by right of wardship or otherwise, of the King or his heirs or at least of his ministers or other chief lords of those fees from the day of making the present writing to the feast of St. Michael next following and thence to the end of twenty-four years next continuously following, to be fully completed; thereafter the said quitclaim shall be held null and of no effect for ever. And John, for himself and his heirs, wills and grants that they shall in no way prosecute or by himself or others make to prosecute or have any action or levying in any manner for their own profit or that of any other person of 2,000 marks which the said Robert before the above Justices of the Bench at Dublin, admitted

himself to owe to the same John, nor shall exact anything thereof nor shall claim to make any levy of any kind for himself before that Robert his heirs and assigns shall fully receive and have the issues and profits of the said tenements during the twenty-four years above-mentioned.

But if the same Sir John and his heirs shall presume to contravene the terms contained in this present writing in whole or in part, then it shall be lawful for Robert his heirs and assigns at their will to prosecute the levying and payment of the said 2,000 marks in which the said John before the said Justices of the Bench at Dublin admitted himself to be bound to the same John [? Robert] and his heirs.

And if John and his heirs on their part shall hold and observe towards Robert and his heirs and assigns the above written conventions fully and in all things according to the form and tenour of this writing, then Robert for himself and his heirs and assigns grants that the said John and his heirs are quit and totally exonerated of the above 2,000 marks. So that neither Robert nor his heirs nor assigns nor any one in their name shall have a claim to exact that sum of money or any part of it from John and his heirs in any way forever by occasion of the same recognition therefor made to him.

Robert also wills and grants for himself, etc., that from the time that he and his heirs, etc., shall fully hold and receive the said tenements and their issues and profits in the form above during the whole term of twenty-four years aforesaid, without any impediment arising as above-stated, then the said quit-claim shall be held null and void. Also it is agreed between John and Robert that John, for himself and his heirs, grants that Robert and his heirs, etc., shall peacefully have and hold the third part of the manor of Lucan which Eleanor formerly wife of Henry de Perche holds in dower there, and a third part of two parts of the same manor which Robert de Wileby, citizen of Dublin, and Alicia his wife similarly hold as dowry of the same Alicia when it shall happen, that is to say from the time when those dowries with their appurtenances in turn shall so happen (*vicissim sic acciderint*) unto the end of the aforesaid twenty-four years fully completed. Robert and his heirs etc. shall have peacefully obtained and have those dowries and their issues and profits in full to the end of the said term, then John wills and grants for himself etc. that the above quit-claim shall stand in full force and remain in the hands of the said Robert and his heirs etc. until they shall peacefully obtain and hold the said dowries and their profits to the value of the issues of those profits, etc. [*ut supra*].

A contemporary roll containing copies of letters from William, archbishop of Cashel, and others, promulgating decrees of Pope

John xxij issued from Avignon in 1317 against those friars, rectors etc. in Ireland who have fostered rebellion against King Edward II.

“ William, archbishop of Cashel, and one of the Legates of the Holy See, greeting to all. He has seen and inspected the letters of William, dean of St. Patrick’s, Dublin, and Peter Wyleby, official of the court of Dublin which run as follows.”

“ William de Rodierd, vicar of Alexander, archbishop of Dublin, and Peter de Wyleby [*ut supra*] to all, greeting, etc. We have seen and inspected the letters of John, supreme Pontiff of the Apostolic See, which run as follows.”

‘ John, Bishop, servant of the servants of God, to the archbishops of Dublin and Cashel, and to the dean of the church of Dublin, greeting and apostolic benediction. We have heard with grief that some brothers of the Mendicant orders and many rectors, vicars and chaplains of parish churches in Ireland withdraw the Irish people who are under their charge from the obedience and fealty due to our dear son, Edward, King of England, assail his royal rights, and by their secret and depraved counsels and incitements stir up the flame they ought rather to seek to extinguish; and give absolution for homicide, arson, sacrilege, robberies and such crimes committed by their people. We therefore command you by our Apostolic writings to warn all such friars of the Preachers and other orders as well as all rectors, etc., of whatsoever rank, order or condition they be, that they entirely cease and desist from such incitements of war and other discords and from giving absolution for such offences. This is to be done within the space of eight days reckoning from the publication of this warning. Otherwise ye shall publicly denounce sentence of excommunication; the sentence to be pronounced on all Sundays and feast days with ringing of bells and quenching of candles, wherever it shall seem fit to you, proceeding the more severely against those whose disobedience and the nature of their deeds deserve it. We also command you to punish by the law of the church those who are found after full inquiry to be guilty in these matters, taking into account if they show penitence and induce others to do the same. And for the performance of all the above, we give you full power, notwithstanding any privileges that members of these orders claim by papal grant not to be excommunicated or suspended except by express papal letters.’

[Liam Price, Esq., D.J., our chief authority on Wicklow place-names, kindly sends the following note with regard to 'Inuyrchely'. "Alan's *Register* (Reeve's copy in T.C.D., p. 561) gives a deed relating to 'Inverholi situate in Leinster', with a reference to

Amauritius de Bellafago. I believe it to be Ennereilly, in the barony of Arklow, Co. Wicklow, which was adjacent to the Butler territory of Arklow. In 1551 the place is called Inhorollyn (*Fiants* Ed. VI., 738) and in 1582 Enoreilin (*Fiants* Eliz. 3918). In Alan's *Repertorium Viride* it is called Innerdeyll, which is probably an inaccurate copy of Inuerdeyli of the *Crede Mihi*. The original was Inberdaele (*Onomasticon Goidelicum*) and 'd', if aspirated, would, I imagine, give a sound represented by ch, th, or h."']

Contemporary copy of a decree by William de Rodierd, dean of St. Patrick's Dublin, Legate of the Holy See, with regard to the division existing between the Franciscans of Irish nation (*hibernici*) and of English (*anglici*) nation in Ireland (contained in the same roll as the letters of Pope John xxij, described formerly under 1317).

"William de Rodierd to Brother Henry, minister of the Friars minor in Ireland, and to the Brothers Durandus and Romanus, visitors of the Order of Friars minor in Ireland, greeting etc. It is found by solemn inquisitions made in various parts of Ireland

that the communities of the Irish friars of your Order in the cities of Cork and Limerick and in the towns of Botionia, Ardath, Nenagh, Clare, Galway and Athlone, are gravely suspect and a danger to the King's peace and the state of the realm. Wherefore we command you on pain of excommunication that ye distribute the said Irish friars throughout the other houses of your order in Ireland, except three or four friars at most whom we permit to remain in each house; in order that a mutual cohabitation of friars of English and Irish blood shall be brought about according to the conditions of such places. We also command for the peace of the realm that Irishmen who are under such censure shall not be guardians in the aforesaid eight places. And for removing all sinister suspicion from your order in future we command that Irish readers (*lectores Hibernici*) who dwell in the aforesaid places shall be distributed throughout other houses of the English friars. Also we command that all Irish friars shall take corporal oath to you or one of you that for the future they will make no suggestions, incitements or secret factions by which the peace of the land can be disturbed. And we command all such friars of the Irish nation under pain of excommunication immediately to obey your commands, according to the tenour of this papal injunction. And this injunction ye shall effectively put into execution within the space of ten days.

Given at Dublin in the Chapter of the Friars minor, anno Domini, 1324, in the seventh indiction of April."

[April 7, 1324.]

"Understanding since the writing of the above that some misinterpret the meaning of our decree, we have thought fit to interpret it more fully, adding some matters which were formerly omitted, namely, that in places from which Irish friars have been removed English friars may be placed at the will of the above minister. Moreover we command that there shall not be Irish readers (*lectores*) in the above-named houses except in Clare and Galway, where by special grace we allow Irish readers to remain. Also we forbid any Irishman to be made Guardian (*custos*) of any part of Ireland except in the two said places, Clare and Galway, which with four others, which were founded in the Irish territories, we permit to remain under the rule of a Guardian of Irish nation. Further we forbid any friar of Irish nation to have general

rule in the whole of Ireland either as head or as deputy (*nec ut prelatus nec ut vicarius*). Also we command that English friars shall be equally mixed with the Irish ones in all houses which are purely Irish, even as on the other hand Irish friars shall be mixed among the English.

It has been brought before the Pope on behalf of the abbots and convents of the Cistercian order in Ireland that whereas they have a Papal indulgence that no one shall presume to exact tithes on account of the pasture or provender of their cattle (*animalia*), yet certain rectors of churches in whose parishes their sheep are grazed presume under threat of ecclesiastical penalties to exact tithes of the wool, milk and lambs of the same from the order and from those who have granted such favours and benefits [of grazing] to the Order. This, as contrary to the above-said indulgence, is severely forbidden by Apostolic authority.”

Indenture of agreement and concord between James, Earl of Ormond, on the one hand and O'Kennedy and Clangillekevynboy on the other, concerning all preys, homicides, and other transgressions made on either side up to the present. The Earl grants to O'Kennedy and those of his nation thirteen carucates of land in Meianarge and one carucate in Clomolyn, paying therefor per annum to the Exchequer 20*l.* per annum for eleven carucates; the other three to be free of rent. The Earl also grants that the said Irish shall make no suit at assizes or county court but they shall make suit at the court of Nenagh during four years until they shall have come to complete peace with the men of the Marches. Also a seneschal acceptable to them and to the Lord shall come to Rathirdill or Galnegarthe as often as is necessary and if it is found by inquisition that O'Kennedy or any of his men have done damage to the Lord or his betaghs they shall atone three-fold and if they have done any damage to the English of the lord they shall atone two-fold, the lord to have half the fine and the injured person the other. Justice to be done to the injured Irish on the part of the English. Further O'Kennedy shall do suit at the court of Nenagh and if it is found by inquisition that he has done any damage to the lord or his betaghs he shall atone three-fold and towards the English of the lord three-fold; half to the lord, etc., as above.

He shall not be arrested in person for any such damage but the lord's serjeant shall levy the damages upon him unless before the lord's departure he has given pledge to make atonement of the same. Further O'Kennedy agrees to serve his lord [the Earl] in his army as he was wont to do to him and his ancestors and to make war upon such English or Irish as shall rise against the lord. Similarly it is agreed that if any of the Earl's men, English or Irish, slay O'Kennedy or any of his men by treachery, the body of the traitor shall be handed over for the body of the slain if he can be found, and if the lord or his sept cannot be found compensation shall be levied and paid to the kindred of the same and he shall have no peace from the lord for ever without the consent of O'Kennedy and his kin. For the full observance of all the above the Earl and O'Kennedy each for himself and his men have found pledges namely the Archbishop of Cashel, etc. [see text] who shall make war upon O'Kennedy or his men if they violate these terms

Further the Earl grants to O'Kennedy and his brothers as far as he is concerned all the lands from Belacharri to the Shannon, paying therefor to the lords of those lands as much rent as three on the side of the English and three on the side of O'Kennedy agree upon.

He is probably 'Thomas le Botiller, chevalier', named above, the father of John, Edmund, Richard, Theobald, Thomas. As however he was only born about 1306 it must be admitted that this gave him little time to be the father of five sons between his coming of age and 1336, but it is possible. In 1355 Edmund son of John le Botiller is mentioned (*ibid.*). The next prominent Thomas Butler is the famous Prior of Kilmainham, who held that office 1403-1418].

Doing therefor to him and his heirs the service of a fourth part of a knight.

Inquisition taken at Kilkenny before Thomas de Rokeby, Justiciar of Ireland, in virtue of a writ of the King directed to him on Friday next before the feast of St. Nicholas in the 30th year of King Edward III, by the following jurors: Richard Houlyn of Knocktopher, David Barret, William White, Henry fitz Nicholas, John Hode, Matthew Walshe, Nicholas Milet, Philip Nangle, Odo fitz John, William Ilger, Richard Harper and

David Eynoke. Who say on oath that it is to the King's loss and prejudice if he grant to James le Botiller, Earl of Ormond, that he may give and assign one messuage and thirteen acres of land with appurtenances in Knocktopher to the Friars of the Carmelite Order in the same town and their successors for ever as is contained in the same writ, for if it happen that the manor of Knocktopher should in any way come into the hands of the King (which manor the said Earl holds of the King in chief by royal service of 40s. when scutage runs) the lord King would lose the value of said messuage and thirteen acres as long as the same manor should remain in the hands of the lord King. Also they say that the quantity of said service from the said messuage, etc., does not extend beyond one penny at each service proclaimed, and that the said messuage, etc., are held of the King in chief as a parcel of the demesnes of the said manor and not of any other. Also that the said messuage, etc., are worth yearly 3s. in all issues and no more.

Letters patent of Henry IV confirming certain grants made when Prince John was Lord of Ireland and then King of England.

1) Inspeximus, dated April 24, 1401, of a charter given by John, Count of Mortain, and Lord of Ireland, under his seal in these words.

“John, Earl of Mortain and Lord of Ireland, to all his men and friends, French, English and Irish, greeting. Know that I have granted and confirmed to Peter Pipard all the land which Uubert (? Vibert—a form of Gilbert), his brother, gave of Peter's land to the same, viz. of his conquest (*de conquestu suo*) in Uriel, namely two cantreds and a half, viz. ‘deferrors’ (Ferrard), with the Castle of Ardee and four burgages in Drogheda, one boat for fishing on the Boyne (Buing), four burgages in Carlingford and these four burgages with the liberty of fishing and the lord's boats (*dominicis batellis*) belonging to said Peter, and the half cantred of Muderne (Mudhorna, Mourne) nearer to the river (*aque*), one cantred of Ethir and a half cantred of Clochkerin (or Clochkerm) and one cantred of Clonoy. To have and to hold

of me and my heirs to Peter and his heirs by service of ten knights.

Wherefore I wish and firmly command that Peter and his heirs after him shall have and hold the said lands freely and quietly, etc., in wood and plain, meadows and pastures, ways and paths, moors and marshes, fishings and warrens, mills and ponds, boroughs and markets, advowsons of churches, castles, toll and theam, infangentheof, judgement of water, iron and (? fork : *furii*), wreck, and all liberties & free customs, except the pleas belonging to the Crown.

2) A similar *inspeximus* of a charter given by Hugh de Lacy, Earl of Ulster, under his seal, in these words.

" Hugh de Lascy, Earl of Ulster, to all, etc., greeting. Know that we have given and granted to Roger Pipard for his homage and service in Ulster one cantred of land, viz. Duffrian with all its appurtenances saving to us all rabbit-warren, (*cunigariis*). To have and to hold of us and our heirs by hereditary right by service of five knights. Wherefore we will and command that he and his heirs have the said cantred (except the rabbit-warrens) freely and quietly etc., with churches and chapels, in wood and plain etc. and all liberties belonging to free land, saving to us the pleas belonging to our sword."

3) Similar *inspeximus* of a charter given by John, King of England and Lord of Ireland, under his seal, in these words.

“ John, King of England, etc., to all Archbishops, bishops, abbots, earls, Justiciars, constables, bailiffs and ministers, French, English and Irish of the land of Ireland, greeting. Know that we have granted and given to Hubert Walter, then (*tunc*) Dean of York, for his homage and service all my town of (*villam*) Luske with all its appurtenances in fee and heritage, to have and to hold of me and my heirs to him and his heirs, well and in peace, freely, quietly, etc., in churches, sanctuaries, chapels, wood, plain, etc., with Sach and Soch, Thol, Them, Infangentheof, judgement of water and iron, and pit and forks (*fosso et furcis*) and duel, and all other free customs pertaining to the same land, save pleas and law-suits which belong to the royal crown, which I have retained to myself (*ad opus meum*).”

4) A similar *inspeximus* of a charter given by John, Lord of Ireland and Count of Mortain, under his seal in these words :

“ John, Lord of Ireland and Count of Mortain, to all his men and friends, French, English and Irish, greeting. Know that we have given and granted to Peter Pippard for his homage and service three cantreds of the land of Uhegeni (or : Uhegem) for the nearer land of Uriel (*sic. : per propinquiores terre de Uriel*). To have and to hold to him and his heirs of me and my heirs by service of twelve knights. Wherefore I will and command that he and his heirs have and hold the said cantreds well and freely in wood and plain etc., etc., etc., in Thol and Them and Sohc and Infangentheoff, judgement of water and iron etc., (as above) with all free customs and liberties.

5) Similar *inspeximus* of a charter given by Nicholas de Verdon under his seal in these words :

“ Know all, etc., that I have given and granted to Theobald Walter, Butler of Ireland, for his homage and service and to his heirs twenty knights’ fees in my land of Honectath in the south part of Ardmacha with all its appurtenances. To have and to hold of me and my heirs to him and his heirs, freely, etc., in woods and ways, etc., etc., in castles, fortresses, advowsons of churches and chapels, with tol and tem, etc. (as above) and all liberties ; doing to me and my heirs the service of four knights for all service and exaction.
