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

INTRODUCTION

The deeds calendared in this volume are that very rare thing in Ireland, the muniments of a family of minor landowners from the thirteenth to the seventeenth centuries. Beginning as burgesses of Dundalk in the thirteenth century, the Dowdalls gradually built up a considerable landed property in co. Louth, and by the sixteenth century, branches of the family were also established as landowners in co. Meath and as merchants in Drogheda and elsewhere, while other families of the name, who had no doubt a connection which cannot now be traced with the main line of Dowdalls, existed in various parts of Ireland. Our deeds are those of the family established at different times at Termonfeckin, Carrickbaggot, Killaly and Castletown, and of the related Dundalk family whose property

passed to it in the sixteenth century.

The first Dowdall to be mentioned in Ireland was William de Duvedal, a prisoner taken in the castle of Carrickfergus. whose release was ordered in April, 1215, and who may perhaps have been the ancestor of all the later Dowdalls.1 There is. however, no further mention of anyone of this name till 1280, when Walter Dovedale and his associates in co. Louth accounted for the chattels of Robert Beg, who abjured the realm.2 He, or more probably his son, appears again in 1306 as a juror in co. Louth, and was clearly already settled in Dundalk, for all his fellow jurors bear names associated with that area.3 As a juror he was presumably a freeholder, but the first piece of property we can show to have been held by the family was Gibbistoun Palmer (Gibstown, bar. Upper Dundalk), which he bought from Hugh Tyling in March 1310.4 He was sheriff of Louth c. 1308-13,5 and died before 1330, when Walter, his son and heir, and William, his son, appear instead, and in 1331 Walter released to his brother all his lands and tenements in the New Town of Dundalk.6 The family was now carried on by William, who c. 1342 was, with William Fot, the tenant

of his father's lands and accounting for his debts at the exchequer. He was sheriff of Louth 1359-63,2 and seems to have died soon afterwards. He was succeeded by his son, John, who held what must have been a very valuable position as agent for the co-heirs of Theobald de Verdon, the overlords of Dundalk and the barony of Ferrard.3 This position had perhaps been inherited from his father, and it seems to have been passed on to his son.4 He was sheriff of Louth c. 1360-74.5 It is not clear whether he or his son, another John, was sheriff in 1383, but it was probably the son, for in 1390 he, lately sheriff of Louth, had terms to pay the arrears of his account.6 John the son married Matilda Gernoun, who was apparently the ultimate heiress of the Gernouns of Mullanstown, for she brought him the lands of that family, Mullanstown, lands in Ardee, and lands in Castleknock.7 It was probably not this John, but his cousin of Termonfeckin, who was ambushed and killed while sheriff of Louth in 1402, but neither of them are heard of after that date.8

Peter, son of John Dowdall of Dundalk and Matilda Gernoun, appears in 1407. In 1408 he obtained from Jenico Dartas, constable of Greencastle and the castle of Carlingford, the custody of these castles, undertaking to pay a yearly rent and to perform various military duties. 10 He made considerable acquisitions of property in and near Dundalk, including the lands of Matthew Flemyng, and those of the families of Rathcoul and Tanner. 11 He does not appear after 1444, and by 1462

his son, Christopher, was dealing with the property. Christopher married Margaret Plunket c. 1468, and died before April 20, 1485, leaving an only daughter, Katherine, on whose death the property was to pass to his cousin, Sir John Dowdall of Termonfeckin.1

The Termonfeckin branch of the family had been founded by Nicholas Dowdall, who was probably the son of the Walter Dowdall of the beginning of the fourteenth century, and, with John Plunket, acquired lands in Newtown Termonfeckin c. 1335.2 His grandson, John, of Termonfeckin, is last mentioned in the deeds on Jan. 28, 1402, and was probably the sheriff of Louth murdered in that year.3 His son, another John, contracted an irregular marriage c. 1422 with Anne Bocumbe, who brought Ricestown, Loppinstown and Rathpobell in co. Meath into the family, and by 1426, when they obtained a papal dispensation, was a knight.4 Their eldest son, Henry, married Johanna Dowdall, daughter and heiress of Robert Dowdall; the second son, Christopher, became archdeacon of Meath; a third, John, married Margaret Jenico or Dartas in circumstances which it was alleged amounted to abduction (but Margaret swore she had not been carried off against her will), and had an only daughter, Eleanor, who married Thomas Fitz William; a fourth, Laurence, married Matilda Fote, daughter of William Foote and Isabella fitz Richard of Glasspistol, and was ancestor of the families of Dowdall of Athlumney, Dowdall of Mounttown, and Dowdall of Brownstown.7 There

were also apparently other sons, and a number of daughters, of whom one. Katherine, was forcibly married to Christopher Verdon. 1

Sir John's great-grandson, James, knighted by October, 1540, secured the inheritance of Christopher Dowdall of Dundalk² in 1538, after many negotiations, finally settled by the marriages of James and his son and heir, Henry, to Joan and Katherine Gernon, daughters of James Gernon of Killincoole, the nephew and successor of John Gernon who had married Margaret Plunket. Christopher's widow.3 The property which had been slowly and laboriously built up in the previous two hundred years by two separate families of Dowdalls was now in a single ownership, and it was at this point that an elaborate rental of the lands in Dundalk was made.4 Tames died in 1558 and was succeeded by his grandson, Christopher; Patrick, his son by Joan Gernon, got the lands in Lobbinstown, Drumcondra, Rathmaiden and Berdistown in co. Meath, with Brownstown and Bronstown in co. Louth. though this was not settled till 1577.5

During the next two generations the property was built up and consolidated, in spite of the extensive mortgages to which Christopher's son, Patrick, was obliged to resort. Patrick's eldest son, another Christopher, married Susanna Smith and built a house in Castletown-Cooley in 1629.6 He died on the eve of the civil war, in February, 1641, and was succeeded by Stephen, his eldest son, who, with his brother Charles, was involved in the rising of 1641.7 Stephen seems before his death to have inherited lands in Maddoxland and elsewhere in Cooley under the marriage settlement of his sister Margaret and Christopher White in 1628.8 He died c. 1645, leaving an infant son and daughter, who both died c. 1651. His youngest. brother, Andrew, who was serving at sea on the royalist side. was left as the ultimate heir. After the restoration Andrew made strenuous attempts to recover the lands, with very little

success, though he seems to have got possession of Killaly. He seems to have left an only son, Patrick, whose daughter, Mary, married Christopher Pippard in 1601, when the family

was merged in that of Pippard.1

The deeds are mainly concerned with the landed property of the Dowdalls, and have very little direct connection with outside events. The chief exception is no. 689, relating the early stages of the rising of 1641 in co. Louth.2 Two indentures of apprenticeship are interesting and unusual in an Irish context. A very interesting document of c. 1613 lists fines for recusancy, payments for watch money, the reward for killing a wolf, and other small payments in the barony of Lower Dundalk.4 A rental of 1407 seems to have no connection with the Dowdalls: it is mainly of the lands which were granted to Richard Rede in 14235—probably a repetition of an earlier grant—but some were certainly held in right of his wife Elizabeth, daughter and heiress of Richard Netterville of Dowth.6

A collection of deeds such as this, spread over so long a period of time, is, however, of great interest, even though mainly confined to the property of one family. In the first place it contains a great deal of raw material for a history of conveyancing in Ireland, and for the early development of the marriage settlement.7 In the second place, these deeds contain a mass of information on the genealogies of Louth families, and on the topography of the county. A large proportion of them are concerned with Dundalk and its neighbourhood, and they throw a great deal of light on the development and topography of the town. Dundalk, that is substantially the modern barony of Upper Dundalk, but including certain lands in the western part of Lower Dundalk, and also the barony of Ferrard, apart from the church lands, had been

granted by John to Bertram de Verdon, probably in 1185, to hold by the service of 20 knights.1 In the early fourteenth century it was divided between the daughters and heiresses of Theobald de Verdun, who married respectively Bartholomew de Burghersh, Thomas de Furnivall, William de Blount, and Henry de Ferrars. None of these had previous interests in Ireland, and the great de Verdun property, which included half of Meath, was so divided as to give each heiress a fraction of each manor, leaving none of them a satisfactory working unit.2 Till the second half of the fourteenth century the property remained in the hands of these absentee owners, but in the 1360's it is evident that growing pressure on absentees to provide for the defence of their lands made it no longer profitable to retain them. 3 John Dowdall was by this time acting as agent for the co-parceners in co. Louth, and in 1365 was in England, no doubt on their business. In 1366 he was nominated as agent of William de Furneval in Ireland, and the sale of the Furnivall purparty to Sir John Bellew must have been completed by August, 1366, when the latter, as lord of Dundalk and le Roche, appointed Dowdall his seneschal in those manors.6 The Ferrars purparty had been sold to Sir Robert Holywood by September, 1364,7 and two at least of the de Verdon heirs had thus anticipated the passing of positive legislation against absentees in 1368.8 other two, the de Burghersh share had been acquired by the Flemings, barons of Slane, before 1372; the remaining share was transferred to Sir John Cruys at some date after 1374.10

The borough of Dundalk was clearly founded by Bertram de Verdun, for in an undated charter he names the burgage

lands of Dundalk as a boundary, while an inquisition of 1312 says that it was founded soon after the acquisition of Ireland by the ancestors of Theobald de Verdon, who enfeoffed divers burgesses with burgages. The first royal charter was granted by Richard II.1. The Norman mote at Castletown seems to have been the caput of the de Verdons in this area, but in the first half of the thirteenth century, with the establishment of the castle of Roch, the centre seems to have shifted there, for no stone castle was built at Castletown till very much later. The first settlement of burgesses must have been at Castletown which in the earlier deeds is always referred to as the Old Town of the Castle of Dundalk, whereas the modern town is the New Town of Dundalk. It is not clear when the New Town was first established: it seems to be first mentioned in an action in the court of common pleas, Dublin, in 1277, when Basilia, widow of Nicholas de Verdon, claimed dower in both the old and new towns of Dundalk, which she said Nicholas had granted her at the door of the church—that is, at the time of their marriage.2 This would apparently bring it back to c. 1260,3 and no doubt it had in fact existed much earlier. When it was first walled we cannot tell: a 'box of the murage of Dundalk' is mentioned in 1305, and the wall of the New Town of Dundalk is mentioned as a boundary in 1315.4 The town does not seem to have overspilled its walls, but its fields covered an extensive area: in the seventeenth century the two townlands of Dundalk and Commons of Dundalk included the modern denominations of Ballynahattin, Cambrickville, Carnbeg, Carnmore, Crumlin, Demesne, Dowdallshill, Fairhill, Glebe, Lisdoo, Lisnawully, Marsh North and South, Marshes Upper and Lower, Moorland, Mounthamilton, Mullagharlin, Point, Priorland, Sportsmanshall, and Stranacarry. 5 The western part of this area may originally have belonged to the Old Town, which continued to have a

separate existence till at least the second half of the fourteenth The topography of the town itself is illustrated

by some detailed seventeenth century maps.2

The identification of the place names of co. Louth has been made more difficult by the absence of the Civil Survey for this county, but this gap is to some extent filled by the existence of a survey of the parishes of co. Louth, made in 1658, which lists the townlands in each parish, while the Down Survey barony maps show most of the townlands very clearly.

The Dowdall Deeds were presented to the National Library of Ireland in 1929, by the late Mr. F. N. Blundell, of Crosby Hall, Blundellsands, Liverpool, the modern representative of this branch of the family. Mr. Blundell also gave the National Library a quantity of Pippard deeds. It was originally proposed by Mr. Joseph Dolan, President of the Co. Louth Archaeological Society, that the Dowdall and Pippard deeds be published in the Journal of that body, but later this undertaking was transferred to the Irish Manuscripts Commission. Owing, however, to the high cost of printing in recent years it was considered inexpedient to include the Pippard Deeds in the published work, since only three of these are earlier than the seventeenth century. They are mainly concerned with Drogheda, and a calendar of the majority of them is available in the National Library, including some transferred from the Lancashire County Record Office.

The late Dr. Charles McNeill, to whose initiative the acquisition of the deeds was mainly due, undertook to edit them, but the delays which followed the outbreak of the war in 1939 meant that he was unable to complete the task, and the Rev. A. Gwynn, S.J., had undertaken to see the volume through the press when in 1948 the acquisition of some 150 further deeds,5 covering the whole period, which Mr. Blundell had deposited in the Lancashire County Record Office with a collection of English deeds, and which with the consent of the late Mr.


Nicholas Blundell, who had succeeded his father, were generously transferred to the National Library, made the task one which required more time that he could spare. The editorship was then transferred to me. This divided editorship has resulted in inevitable inconsistencies in the presentation of the deeds, but while the form was decided by Dr. McNeill, and has been followed as far as possible, final responsibility for any errors must rest with the last editor. In general, the deeds have been given in a calendared form, but a few, which had been set up from a full transcript by Dr. McNeill, have been left as they stood. All deeds are in Latin and on parchment unless otherwise stated. Endorsements have not been noted unless they supplement the information in the body of the deed.

I have been helped by many people in the preparation of this calendar. The Rev. D. MacIvor, C.C., most generously put his notes on the Dowdall family at my disposal, saving me hours of labour in searching for scattered references to complete the pedigree. The Rev. A. Gwynn kindly made himself responsible for the strictly ecclesiastical deeds. E. I. F. Arnould of Trinity College helped me with the translation of no. 110. The authorities of the Detective Branch of the Civic Guard allowed me to use their ultra violet ray apparatus to read two otherwise illegible deeds. Dr. McLysaght, Chairman of the MSS. Commission, has given me constant encouragement, advice, and help in the reading of seventeenthcentury signatures, while Miss Brereton, the Commission's Secretary, has dealt patiently and helpfully with constant queries about proof correction. Finally, the Wood Printing Works has shown great forbearance with a text which presented many difficulties.

DOWDALL PEDIGREES 1





Martin, same term, to perclose his account of that office. before which day Sir James de la Hyde was killed by McGynouse and other Irish of Ulster, the king's enemies, who after that destroyed and plundered the county of Uriel and the king's lieges of that county. The sheriff, hearing of this, assembled the whole power of the county and went to the marches of the said county to resist them and kept the marches till the quinzaine of St. Martin last, at their great costs the rebels out of the marches to the great honour of the King and profit of his lieges and the said treasurer and barons, knowing nothing of the said mischiefs, summoned the sheriff to appear before them at the said quinzaine to perclose his said account, and for that he did not come he incurred forfeiture of his recognizance of 20li., for which he is now impeached in the exchequer.

Douedale begs that regard be had to his great labours and costs, and that he could not come to the exchequer at the said quinzaine without great destruction of the county for the reasons given.

Referred to the treasurer and barons of the exchequer: if it is found by inquisition that the facts are as stated, he is to be discharged of the 20li.

And the said Robert and Thomas Clyntoun had a day concerning the said plea in the Common Bench by writ of nisi prius before Robert de Prestoun, chief justice of the said Bench, at Drogheda on Thursday the feast of St. Bartholomew last, at which day the justice, because it had been certified to him that the said tenements had been taken into the king's hand because of the outlawry of the said Thomas de Verdoun, and also because the said Thomas de Clyntoun was dead before that day, would not proceed to take the jury, to the great loss of the said Robert, upon which he petitioned for a remedy. The king therefore commanded the said governor and custos that, having viewed the cause of the seizure of the said tenements into the king's hand and called before him the farmers of the tenements and the king's serjeants and others of those parts, he should ascertain the truth by inquisition or otherwise and do according to right and the law and custom of the land of Ireland, as has been accustomed to be done in such cases. And an inquisition taken before Brother William Tany, Prior of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in Ireland. when he was justiciar having been viewed, by which it appeared that John Crikcot on the day he died held the said tenements of the said Thomas de Verdoun as of the manor of Clonmore, in the king's hand by reason of Thomas's outlawry, by military service, and that the custody was in the king's hand because of the minority of John's heir, and Roger Gernoun, farmer of the said tenements, and the king's serjeants and others called for him in that matter having been duly warned, Henry Michell, pleading for the king, alleged that the tenements were held of the king as of the manor of Clonmore, etc., and not of the said Robert as he suggests in his petition, and offered to prove this. And Robert answered that the said tenements were held immediately of him in chief by military service and not of the king, and offered similarly to prove this. Should Peter break any of his covenants and not take care to amend the matter within a fortnight after complaint by Janico, then Janico may re-enter and have again the castles and all their appurtenances without opposition by anyone. John Dowdal, layman, and Anne Bocumbe, of the dioceses of Armagh and Meath, have petitioned the Pope that as they knowingly entered on marriage, not being unaware that they were related to one another in the fourth and fourth degrees of consanguinity, and have solemnized this marriage in the presence of the church and have consummated it; and since they cannot lawfully remain in this marriage without having obtained an apostolic dispensation, the said John and Anne humbly beg that the Pope may deign to grant them absolution from the sentence of excommunication which they have incurred by this marriage, and also the necessary dispensation. Pope is willing to grant this petition, and commissions the bishop to absolve John and Anne by virtue of apostolic faculties granted for this occasion only, and in the usual form of law. The bishop is to exact an oath from John and Anne that they will not commit the like again nor give aid or counsel to others who shall commit the like, impose a salutary penance, and enjoin whatever else is to be enjoined by law. If the bishop is willing to grant the dispensation, he is to see to it that John and Anne be separated for some suitable time, so that they may freely and lawfully contract anew this marriage and remain in it for the future; and he is to dispense by the same authority whatever children may have been born of this marriage, declaring them to be legitimate.

And as to 26s. 8d. of the said 4 li. he acknowledges that he owes it to the said Hugh, but his said attorney says that he owes nothing of 53, 4d., the residue of the said 4 li., and this he is prepared to verify, etc., and he seeks judgment etc. And the said Hugh by his said attorney says that the said Robert the defendant owes him the said 4 li. as he declared above, and this he is prepared to verify. The said Robert by his said attorney denies it, and so to a jury, etc......... [The sheriff was directed by] a writ of this exchequer of venire facias to have here a jury on Thursday before St. John Baptist next following, and the same day is given to the parties by their attorneys. On which day the parties came by their attorneys [and the sheriff] returned the said writ directed to him, and the jury did not come etc. Wherefore [he was directed by writ of this] exchequer to have the bodies of the said jury on Thursday after the..... the apostles [? Peter and Paul] next following etc..... and the same day was given to the parties..... On which day the parties came by their attorneys and the said sheriff returned the said writ directed to him and the names of the jury Bossard of the same and other jurors whose names.....

And having viewed the said record and process it is considered and agreed by the barons of this exchequer that the said Hugh should recover the said 4 li. against the said Robert together with the said 13s. ..d. taxed by the said jury, and the said Robert in mercy for unjust detention of the said 4 li. etc.

So badly faded that it could only be read by ultra-violet light, under which many words remained illegible. The words in square brackets have been supplied as required by the context. It is clear from the persons concerned that it belongs to the reign of Henry VI.

had the toll of the said mill carried peacefully and quietly to Green Castle (Viridum Castellum) to his own use. Asked if he knew Richard Sedgre to assert any right or claim in the said mill he said that he never heard or knew that the said Richard asserted any right or claim in the said mill, and that frequently in witness's time the same Richard Sedgre had his grain milled there and paid toll like another and that the toll of the said Richard Sedgre was frequently carried to Green Castle with other tolls to the use of Peter Douedall. Asked if he knew the site of the mill called More is myll he said that it was situated in the land of Henry More between the said Peter's mill on one side and the sea on the other. assigning us too short a term, in a case of formal appeal from our correction and visitation interposed by the priors or proctors of Dewleke and Colpe in Ireland; and fearing from probable conjectures and causes that we may be more burdened in the future, we in our own name and that of our dean and chapter and the clergy of our church of Armagh appeal in these writings to the aforesaid most holy father and to his holy apostolic see, submitting ourselves, our dean and chapter and clergy and our aforesaid church, our state and jurisdiction and that of all our province of Armagh as well as all men who adhere to us and our aforesaid church or may wish to adhere to us in the future with our moveable and immoveable goods, to the protection, safeguarding and defense of the aforesaid most holy father and of his apostolic see; and we protest that we wish to prosecute this our appeal and provocation within the limits of law (infra fatalia iuris), and that we wish to correct, add to or subtract from the same as often as may be needed or may seem to us expedient.

To the third he says that the mill has been there of his knowledge for above the last 70 years, etc., as the first witness. To the fourth he answers as the first witness. The reason of his knowledge is that he was born in Merlistone and continued there for 24 years, all which time the watercourse ran as it does now.

Rory O Merigan of Ballamakenny in the liberties of Drogheda, aged 92 or thereabouts, duly sworn and examined, answers yes to the first two questions. The defendants replied that the said parcel of ground was part and parcel of Carrick and had been always so enjoyed. Christopher and Stephen agree that the portions charged on Christopher's lands for his sons Charles and Andrew and his daughter Sara by a conveyance dated 13 Feb., 1627 (old style) (No. 650) shall be paid out of Christopher's personal estate and his lands discharged as if the conveyance had never been made.

Christopher and Stephen agree that Charles shall have the castle, town and lands of Castleton, with the mill and all other appurtenances, for 21 years after his father's death, paying to Stephen and his heirs £40 sterling a year in equal parts at May and Alhalontide.

Christopher agrees that after his death Stephen shall have the chief and best cup of his plate, his best horse and the "furnas" in Castelton for principals. Stephen shall give his said brother Charles the "furnas" and the clock in Killaly, and shall have the clock in Castleton himself.

Petition and claim of Andrew Dowdall, Esq., of Kilaly, co. Louth, to the commissioners for executing His Majesty's gracious declaration for the settlement of Ireland.

Summarizes no. 650, by virtue of which the feoffees were seised in their demesne as of fee of the premises contained in the schedule to the uses expressed in the settlement, and so continued until the death of the said Christopher and Susanna Dowdall his wife, after which Stephen Dowdall, Christopher's son and heir, by virtue of the statute of transferring uses into possession, became seised of the premises in his demesne as of fee tail, to him and the heirs male of his body, with remainders, etc., and continued so seised and actually possessed until he died about the year 1645, having issue only a son and a daughter, Christopher and Susanna, both of whom, being of tender age, died about the year 1651 without issue, by whose death the premises remained and came to the petitioner as son and heir male of the body of the said Christopher the elder, and he claims the premises as his undoubted right and inheritance. hitherto kept and unjustly detained from him by the late usurped power and now in his majesty's hands free from adventurers or soldiers.

The petitioner these 10 or 11 years last past faithfully served his majesty on sea and land, serving as well by his adventure as in person, having had the command of the soldiery in divers of the frigates employed by virtue of the Duke of York's commission in foreign parts, in which service, being often taken at sea, he suffered many losses and three years hard imprisonment, yet still to his utmost endeavours promoted his majesty's service, and for his constancy therein was kept from his estate by the usurped power, as appears by the certificate of the judge of the court of admiralty and several others. In consideration of which his majesty by letters of Nov. 10, 1660 (no. 696) ordered that he should be restored, etc. He says further that he and the said Stephen were always faithful and loval to and never acted against his late majesty or the present king. and in testimony of their loyalty obeyed his majesty's commands, as well those commands and directions relating to the peace concluded Jan. 17, 1648, (old style) by the Duke of Ormond as others, and that he did never sue for or take out any decree for lands in the province of Connaght or co. of Clare, in respect of all which he conceives he is restorable by the act of settlement.
