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INTRODUCTION

The Act setting up the Registry of Deeds in Ireland included provision for the registering of all Wills and devises in writing where "the devisor or testatrix shall die after the said 25th March 1708." Nevertheless, there are, in this volume of Abstracts, several instances of testators who took the unusual step of recording their own Wills, as, for example, John Gaynor.⁽¹⁾ He was so angry with his two undutiful daughters for not visiting him during his long illness that he drew up a Will leaving them one shilling each, and registered it himself.

The Registry of Deeds is indeed a mine of information, and, from the genealogical point of view in particular, much can be learnt from the vast mass of material available—not only from the Wills but from marriage settlements, leases, and recorded Deeds of all kinds.⁽²⁾ The Wills at the Registry of Deeds have now a special importance because they replace some of those destroyed in the Record Office in 1922, when virtually all the original Irish Prerogative and Consistorial Wills perished.⁽³⁾ As explained more fully in the

Sir William Betham, Ulster King of Arms, compiled his valuable Will Pedigrees from all the Prerogative Wills up to the year 1800. His volumes of these pedigrees, now at the Genealogical Office, Dublin Castle, have been used in checking many doubtful points met with in the Wills recorded at the Registry of Deeds. I am indebted to Dr. Edward MacLysaght, Keeper of Manuscripts, National Library, and Chief Herald, for enabling me to consult these and other MSS.

Introduction to Vol. I *Abstracts of Wills at the Registry of Deeds 1708-45* Wills were recorded at the Registry in one of three ways which, for the sake of brevity, I have termed "Full," "Narrate" and "Précis." A Will described as "Full" in the following abstracts is one which was registered in the testator's own words, a "Narrate" is a Will recorded in the third person singular, while a "Précis" is a brief statement showing to whom a testator assigned his real estate. Transcripts of the memorials of the Wills and all other forms of Deeds are bound into large Books and may be inspected at the Registry of Deeds, on payment of a small fee. The original memorials, signed and sealed by the person registering the Will or Deed, are stored in a fireproof vault. These documents should always be examined if there is any doubt as to the accuracy of the copies in the Books of Transcripts.

Method adopted in making abstracts

The Abstracts were made from the transcripts of the Wills, many doubtful points having been checked with the original memorials. The Abstracts are numbered in chronological order of registration. Following the *name and address* of the testator is his *occupation*, if mentioned in the Will. After the *date of signing* the Will comes the description of *how it is recorded* at the Registry of Deeds (that is, whether in "full," "narrate" or "précis" form), *the length of the transcript of the memorial and the date of registration*. *The relatives* are listed next as they are described by the testator. Ambiguous descriptions are, unfortunately, often used, particularly in the case of Wills recorded in the third person singular. In order to give every possible clue to the correct identity of the persons named all surnames have been copied. Following the relatives come the names and addresses of all other *legatees, trustees, executors, etc.*, and any outstanding legacy of general interest. Less important legacies to charities have been omitted from the Abstracts, but bequests to churches are included as this information is sometimes helpful to the research worker. *The lands* detailed by the testator are then listed. The names of grantors are given, especially in cases where the exact localities of the lands are either not mentioned at all by the testator or are not clearly stated⁽¹⁾. The *names of the witnesses* to the signing of the Will are next shown, followed by the

names of *those who witness the registration* of the memorial after the testator's death. One of these, usually an executor named in the Will, signs and seals the memorial. By quoting the *number of the Book, page and memorial*, which are given at the end of each abstract, a certified copy of the memorial of the Will from which the Abstract was made can be obtained from the Assistant Registrar of Deeds, Registry of Deeds, Henrietta Street, Dublin⁽¹⁾.

The dates given in the Abstracts are exactly as found, that is, following the official Old Style year before 1752. In the Old Style year the new year commenced on Lady Day 25th March. This accounts for dates which would at first glance seem to imply that a Will was registered before it was written by the testator. In such cases the date of registration has been amended⁽²⁾. Scotland adopted New Style in 1600 but in England and Ireland Old Style continued until 1752 when eleven days in September were dropped out of the Calendar for that year.

Indexing of personal and place names in the abstracts

In the index of personal names I have assigned surnames to persons such as sons and daughters mentioned by testators by their christian names only. The fact, therefore, that a surname appears in the Index of Persons does not imply that it should be read into the Abstract. Married daughters are indexed under both their maiden and their married surnames whether the maiden surname appears in the Will or not. The words "my sister" (or "my brother," "my mother" etc.) are often used incorrectly. Great care must be exercised in deciding on exact relationships, especially when either "sister-in-law" or "step-sister" could be inferred. Because of these possibilities I have seldom added a maiden surname to the Index as a cross reference.

Place names are often difficult to index in cases where the testator or person registering the Will had not indicated county or barony. Where it has been possible to ascertain the precise location of any particular place the county has been inserted in

square brackets in the Abstracts. Similarly place names which seemed particularly unusual in sound or spelling are followed by corrections—as suggestions—within square brackets⁽¹⁾.

I am again indebted to the Registrar of Deeds, Mr. J. M. O'Byrne, B.L., for permission to make these Abstracts, and to the successive Assistant Registrars under whose authority I worked. The task of handling the heavy Books of transcripts and of examining memorials in the vaults was made easier for me by the willing help of the staff, to whom I return my best thanks. Finally I must again thank Prof. J. Otway Ruthven for her advice.
